I recently read David McCullough's book, "The Pioneers," which describes the settlement of the Ohio territory.

Manasseh Cutler, a pastor, was influential in the passage of the Northwest Ordinance in 1787, which highlighted the importance of education and the prohibition of slavery in the Ohio territory. His son,

Ephraim Cutler (1767-1853), was one of the pioneers who settled in Marietta, Ohio, and helped ensure public education and the prohibition of slavery. Toward the end of his life, while reflecting upon the pioneers, he said, “The character ought to be known of these bold pioneers. ... From when did they spring? ... For what causes, under what circumstances and for what objects were difficulties met and overcome.”

This quote is inspirational for Tusculum pioneers, as it speaks to character, innovation, resilience and hard-earned accomplishments. Reflect on this quote in light of our mission to build on a pioneering spirit and to inspire civic engagement. We are Pioneers.

College of Education receives praise from national organization

The College of Education recently received third-party validation of its efforts to help students of color become teachers.

The National Council on Teacher Quality named Tusculum as one of 89 education institutions in the United States that exhibit equity and excellence in licensure exam pass rates for aspiring teachers of color. Tusculum was the only institution in Tennessee and one of only 20 chosen across the country for also being less selective in its admissions decision-making but having alumni achieve high pass rates.

In a July report, the NCTQ said the 89 institutions have something in common. First, little or no disparity in pass rates exists between aspiring teachers of color and white aspiring teachers at the institution. Second, test takers of color achieve greater success on licensure exams compared to the average pass rate for everyone across the state.

New chair selected for the English and Languages Department

Dr. Anne Acker, associate professor of English, has been named the new chair of Tusculum's English and Languages Department.

She has served Tusculum in a variety of teaching roles since 2005 and was promoted to associate professor in 2020. Dr. Acker teaches British Literature and World Literature and courses in research, mythology and Shakespeare. Outside the classroom, she has been a member of the university's General Education Committee since 2018 and vice chair since 2019. She has served as faculty advisor to the English Student Organization since 2017.

"It is no small honor to be chair of English and Languages at Tusculum," said Wayne Thomas, dean of the College of Civic and Liberal Arts. "These programs have produced some of our most impressive alumni in recent years. Dr. Acker has seen firsthand many exciting ventures in the English and Languages Department and other departments in the college. I know this exciting and healthy culture will continue under her leadership."

Dr. Acker, a Johnson City native, holds a bachelor's degree from Milligan College, a master's degree from East Tennessee State University and a doctorate from the University of Tennessee, all in English. Her concentration for her doctorate was in Renaissance Literature and rhetoric, and her dissertation was titled "Identity and Divinity: Self-Knowledge and Sanctification in 16th- and 17th-Century Literature."

Department of Mathematics and Computer Science has new leader

We are also pleased to share that Dr. Faisal Al-khateeb, an associate professor of computer science, has been selected as the new chair of the Mathematics and Computer Science Department.

Dr. Al-khateeb has served at Tusculum since 2019. During his academic career, which has spanned about 22 years, Dr. Al-khateeb has taught a wide range of subjects, including cyber security, e-commerce and managing data communication and networks.

“I picked Dr. Al-khateeb as chair because he has experience in administration at other institutions,” said Dr. Heather Henson-Ramsey, dean of the College of Science, Technology and Mathematics. “Dr. Al-

khateeb is a strong academic, who puts student needs first and, as an instructor, challenges and engages them. He is respected by the department and will lead with thoughtfulness and fairness.”

Earlier in his career, Dr. Al-khateeb served as associate dean and executive director of the Assessment Department for the School of Management at the New York Institute of Technology in the United Arab Emirates and the Management Information Systems track chair for the College of Business and Economics at United Arab Emirates University.

“The Department of Math and Computer Science at Tusculum has several strengths, including being student service-oriented and trying our best to bring a practical and applied perspective to the classroom by bridging the gap between theory and real industry needs in the market,” Dr. Al-khateeb said. “Our faculty in the department put students first and individualize student learning by engaging them in different ways to personalize the educational material delivered.”

Dr. Al-khateeb has a doctorate in information systems decision sciences from Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

Crabtree, who started her duties Monday, July 27, is excited to return to the office where she worked from 1999-2007.

"I look forward to providing support for current funding initiatives from grants and foundations, as well as identifying potential growth in these areas," she said. "Engagement with the Tusculum University family will be an important component to the success of this role."

Crabtree will continue to serve as well as the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief data specialist for Greeneville City Schools.

She lives in Chuckey with her husband, Travis, where they care for eight rescue cats and a rescue border collie. Each spring and summer, you will find their property full of large flower gardens in an effort to contribute to the care of earth's pollinators, a passion Crabtree has had for over a decade and hopes will inspire others. Time for employees to register vehicles and secure reserved parking spaces

The start of the academic year also means it is time for all faculty and staff to register any vehicles they will park on campus and request reserved parking spaces that might interest them.

Faculty and staff members will not have to pay a registration fee for the first vehicle but must pay \$20 for each additional vehicle. To register their vehicle, they need to visit <https://www.permitsales.net/TusculumU>. Once they are registered, they can go to Campus Safety to pick up their sticker. The penalty for parking an unregistered vehicle is \$75 per citation.

Anyone securing a reserved parking space will have exclusive access to it Monday-Friday from 7 a.m.-5 p.m. At all other times, faculty, staff and members of the public may use these spaces. Students are never allowed to park in yellow lined spaces regardless of the hours.

Those who reserved a space for the 2021-22 academic year can keep the same location or change it for the new academic year. They and those who are reserving a space for the first time need to sign up at <https://ws.tusculum.edu/forms/tu-reserved-parking-reservation-form/>. The cost for a reserved space is \$225.

Tusculum will allocate reserved spaces based on employees' lot preferences. Faculty and staff must provide their first and second preference for parking lots. If the number of first preferences for a lot exceeds available reserved spaces, service time at Tusculum will be the deciding factor.

Employees can pay for reserved spaces upfront or through payroll deduction.

We will strictly enforce the reserved parking space policy. If another vehicle is parked in your space during the reserved time, it will be towed. Campus Safety will issue no tickets or warnings except during the first two weeks of each semester.

The fall semester starts this month, and students should be sure they register for classes. They can review courses available during the fall semester by visiting the portal and submit [registration forms](#) to the Registrar's Office at registrartu@tusculum.edu.

Students need to remember:

- They must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses.
- They must not have a business office hold on their student account because they will not be able to register for courses until they resolve it.

We are in the final stages of filling housing slots, so students who want to live in a residence hall or the apartments for the fall semester need to sign up now.
