Tusculum opened the Wellness Center today

The health and well-being of the Tusculum family will benefit considerably from today's opening of the Wellness Center in the Scott M. Niswonger Commons.

The Wellness Center, located on the first floor of the building and below Pioneer Arena, opened for all students, faculty and staff. Operating hours are 6 a.m.-10 p.m. Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-7 p.m. Saturday and 1-7 p.m. Sunday.

The facility contains treadmills, elliptical machines and weight machines and gives all Tusculum family members a chance for a well-rounded workout. Dr. Suzanne Byrd, department chair and associate professor of sport science, has agreed to provide drop-in orientation sessions at 1 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 7, and noon, Tuesday, Sept. 13. People can email her at sbyrd@tusculum.edu if they want to schedule a personal session on workout planning for a busy life.

Doug Jones, vice president of athletics and university initiatives, who has been the driving force behind the Wellness Center initiative, said the facility is valuable because it promotes wellness and good habits across campus. He said it is a perfect place for faculty and staff to engage in a workout before or after work. Students will also have an opportunity to schedule time around their classes.

The Office of Student Affairs will operate the Wellness Center and is available for any questions. The facility will be under 24-hour-a-day surveillance to ensure the safety of all Wellness Center users and protection of the equipment.


Lecture about 9/11 coming to Tusculum

Dr. Troy Goodale, chair of the Social Sciences Department, will deliver a free lecture on 9/11 as part of Tusculum's Cicero Lecture Series Monday, Sept. 12, at 7 p.m. in the Meen Center lecture hall.

The presentation, "9/11: Numbers of Notoriety, Day of Infamy," was originally scheduled for September of 2021 but was postponed because of the state of the coronavirus in the region at that time.

In his lecture, Dr. Goodale, who also serves as professor of political science, will discuss some of the sinister acts in the years preceding that day, the rise of Al-Qaeda and the cumulative response by the United States. Specifically, he will provide background information about Al-Qaeda – its origins and its activities throughout the 1990s, including the USS Cole attack and the attack on the U.S. Embassy in Nairobi; the organization's declaration of war on America; and the nation's underestimation of the threat the group posed.

Dr. Goodale will review the events of 9/11 in detail and Al-Qaeda's preparation for the multiple attacks. In addition, he will examine the aftermath of 9/11 in U.S. foreign policy, including the nation's entry into the war in Afghanistan and the withdrawal of American troops from that country.



Play coming in September to Tusculum

Theatre-at Tusculum will hold six performances of "Lemons, Lemons, Lemons, Lemons, Lemons" on campus in September, and all Tusculum family members are encouraged to attend!

The play will be held Sept. 23, Sept. 24, Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 at 7:30 p.m. and Sept. 25 and Oct. 2 at 2 p.m. in the Behan Arena Theatre. All students, faculty and staff are eligible for one free ticket. Additional

tickets cost \$15 for anyone 12-59 years old, \$12 for anyone 60 or older and \$5 for children younger than 5.

"Lemons, Lemons, Lemons, Lemons" features two characters. Bernadette is an ambitious attorney, and Oliver is a laid-back musician. A new law interrupts their love story by limiting the amount of words a citizen can speak to 140 per day.

The play by Sam Steiner considers a world in which people must say less. It contemplates what people say and how they say it. This production also touches on activism, eye contact and what people can hear in silence. The cast features two Tusculum staff members – Steve Schultz and Erin Hensley Shultz. Frank Mengel will lead set design, and three students – Todd Wallin, Josie Norton and Gracie Weems – will run the show backstage.

English professor named to serve as an endowed chair

Congratulations to Kelsey Trom, associate professor of English, for being selected as the Harriet Reaves Neff '21 Chair of Fine Arts. This is an endowed chair last held by Marilyn duBrisk when she served as our artist-in-residence.

Wayne Thomas, dean of the College of Civic and Liberal Arts, said the honor recognizes all of the ways Trom supports Tusculum.

"Kelsey is one of our most industrious and talented faculty members," Thomas said. "She is devoted to her students and to her program, and her students are extremely devoted to her. There is no one more deserving to follow in the footsteps of the great Marilyn duBrisk for this honor."

Trom also earned this selection for her leadership of Tusculum's creative writing program. She has served as the writing program coordinator and editor of The Tusculum Review, the university's international literary journal, since 2019. She also coordinated the Old Oak Festival workshops, geared toward high school students, for four years. During the 2021-22 academic year, she collaborated with students to create "Sit Lux," a student-run publication featuring student and alumni writings.

In addition, she hosted the virtual Afrofuturism lecture series in the summer of 2020 and was instrumental in establishing our Black in Greene series.

"Endowed chairs or professorships are often considered the highest academic honor a university can confer on a faculty member, as they last as long as the university exists," said Dr. Tricia Hunsader, provost and vice president of academic affairs. "Indeed, endowments are both an honor to the named faculty member and also to the donor who establishes it. We are pleased to highlight Kelsey's excellence by naming her to this chair."

Trom has served as a Tusculum faculty member since 2014.

Pioneer WOW concludes


New Tusculum students have a much more thorough of Tusculum and have met many more students, as well as faculty and staff, through their Pioneer WOW experience.
