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President's Perspective

Last week, I attended the APCU (Association of Presbyterian Colleges and Universities) Presidents Retreat in Dallas. I always find it advantageous to hear how other universities deal with similar issues such as COVID-19, enrollment and retention.

A major topic of discussion was how we draw upon our Presbyterian heritage and live out our Christian values. We are better universities, serve our students better and provide a more valuable education because we are Christian universities. All universities provide majors and minors, but we help students discover their calling and purpose. Our universities educate the whole person and prepare students for life, not just jobs.

Most of our universities have "covenants" with the Presbyterian Church. These articulate our understanding of the nature of a Christian university. Here are a few examples from the many principles listed in our covenant with the Synod of Living Waters.

"Tusculum University seeks to instill in its graduates a sense of the world in which they live and to develop skills to make sound decisions that are based on the common good. In short, Tusculum wants to graduate students who not only do well, but do good. An important part of Tusculum University's educational mission is to recruit a fertile mix of students from different ethnic, national, racial, cultural, religious and geographic backgrounds. Learning from fellow students resulting from such a campus cultural mix is an essential part of fostering an emphasis on practical wisdom."

Another principle mentions "while insisting on freedom of inquiry for the faculty and students, to create a campus climate in which the Christian faith is reasonably and persuasively presented without undue pressing for acceptance." Further, it states we are "to provide opportunities for the exploration of the relationship between religion and other facets of life." And one last example is "to demonstrate active concern for social justice and human mercy among the entire campus community, fostering a keen spirit of volunteerism."

Registration for the fall semester has arrived!

Students are able to register for the fall semester this week. They can review courses available during the fall semester by visiting the portal.

Here is the registration schedule:

It is important for students to remember:

- They must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses.
- They will not be able to register for courses if they have a business office hold on their student account.
- They will not be able to participate in the housing lottery the week of April 4 if they do not register for courses to be held in the fall.

Take advantage of a price break for courses in the summer!

One of the additional benefits of taking undergraduate courses during the summer terms is the reduced cost for traditional undergraduate students. Did you know the price is just \$365 per credit hour?

We hope our students will take that savings into account as they consider their plans for the summer. Not only are they able to get ahead or catch up on credits, they can pay less than they would for the fall and spring semester!

Students can utilize federal financial aid to cover their tuition costs for the summer. They should check with the Tusculum financial aid team, which will be happy to discuss their options with them

Registration is already underway in Anthology for summer terms. We currently have three summer sessions.

- Full – May 16-Aug. 12
- Early – May 16-June 24
- Late – June 27-Aug. 12

Students need to remember a few key requirements about summer registration. They cannot register for the summer terms if they have a business hold. In addition, they need to meet with their advisor before starting the registration process.

Income tax filing assistance still available for Tusculum family members

The filing deadline for 2021 income taxes is coming soon, and Tusculum can help you complete that task.

The Tusculum Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program offers free tax preparation services for faculty, staff and students as well as the community. This year, the team of Tusculum students and community volunteers who prepare the returns will be available to help at three locations until Monday, April 11

Services are available in Rooms 001 and 005 of the Meen Center on Thursdays as well as Westminster Presbyterian Church in Johnson City on Mondays and the Washington County Library in Jonesborough on Saturdays.

Tusculum family members are eligible for assistance regardless of their income level. Those in the community who might qualify are:

- People who generally earn less than \$59,000 a year
- Anyone older than 65
- People with disabilities
- Limited-English-speaking taxpayers

Last week, local and state authorities captured a 500-pound bear that was near the Tusculum campus and relocated it to the Cherokee National Forest.

This bear has previously come onto the campus, and we are hopeful the actions of the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency and the Greeneville Fire Department will prevent that from happening in the future.

Jon Gresham, chief of campus safety, emphasizes that all wildlife, especially bears, should be left alone. Anyone who spots a bear or other dangerous wildlife on campus should head indoors and call Campus Safety as soon as possible. Bears do not want to be petted, and participating in that action is extremely dangerous.
