Additional tickets cost \$15 for anyone 12-59 years old, \$12 for anyone 60 or older and \$5 for children younger than 12. Tusculum Arts Outreach recommends that attendees be at least 17 years old due to adult language and themes.

The cast features two Tusculum staff members – Steve Schultz, director of admission operations, and Erin Hensley Schultz, costume director. Steve Schultz plays Oliver, a laid-back musician, and Erin Schultz plays Bernadette, an ambitious attorney. Wayne Thomas, executive director of Tusculum Arts Outreach and dean of the College of Civic and Liberal Arts, directs the play. Frank Mengel leads set design, and three students – Todd Wallin, Josie Norton and Gracie Weems – run the show backstage.

Important reminders about parking regulations

We have important information to share about on-campus parking.

- All students, faculty, and staff are required to register their vehicles with the Office of Campus Safety.
- All students, faculty, and staff are required to park vehicles in their designated areas.
 - Residential freshmen have designated parking in the Indoor Practice Facility and Practice Field lots.
 - All other students, including commuters, have designated parking in red or white-lined spaces.
 - Faculty and staff have designated parking in spaces with white or yellow lines.
- No parking is permitted anytime:
 - In any visitor space (outside visitors only)
 - In any designated fire lane (yellow curb or hash marks)
 - In front of (or alongside) a fire hydrant
 - In or adjacent to construction/work area or entrance
 - On any campus roadway
 - On the side of any campus roadway
 - In any driveway/loading area
 - In handicap areas without a state-issued permit
 - In a way that creates an open and obvious hazard
 - In Facilities Management's lot
 - On any grass or unpaved area
 - On any sidewalk, path or crosswalk

- Spaces reserved (from 7 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday)
- Spaces temporarily reserved (applicable 24 hours)
- In any cul-de-sac (only used for 15-minute load/unload)
- Reserved parking will be in effect year-round, Monday-Friday, 7 a.m.-5 p.m. Outside of reserved hours, reserved spaces (except the president's spaces) are open to visitors and other employees during events but must be vacated by 7 a.m. Monday-Friday.

Campus Safety will continue to issue tickets to unregistered vehicles, as well as vehicles parked outside their designated areas. Vehicles parked in someone else's reserved spot between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. will be towed at the owner's expense.

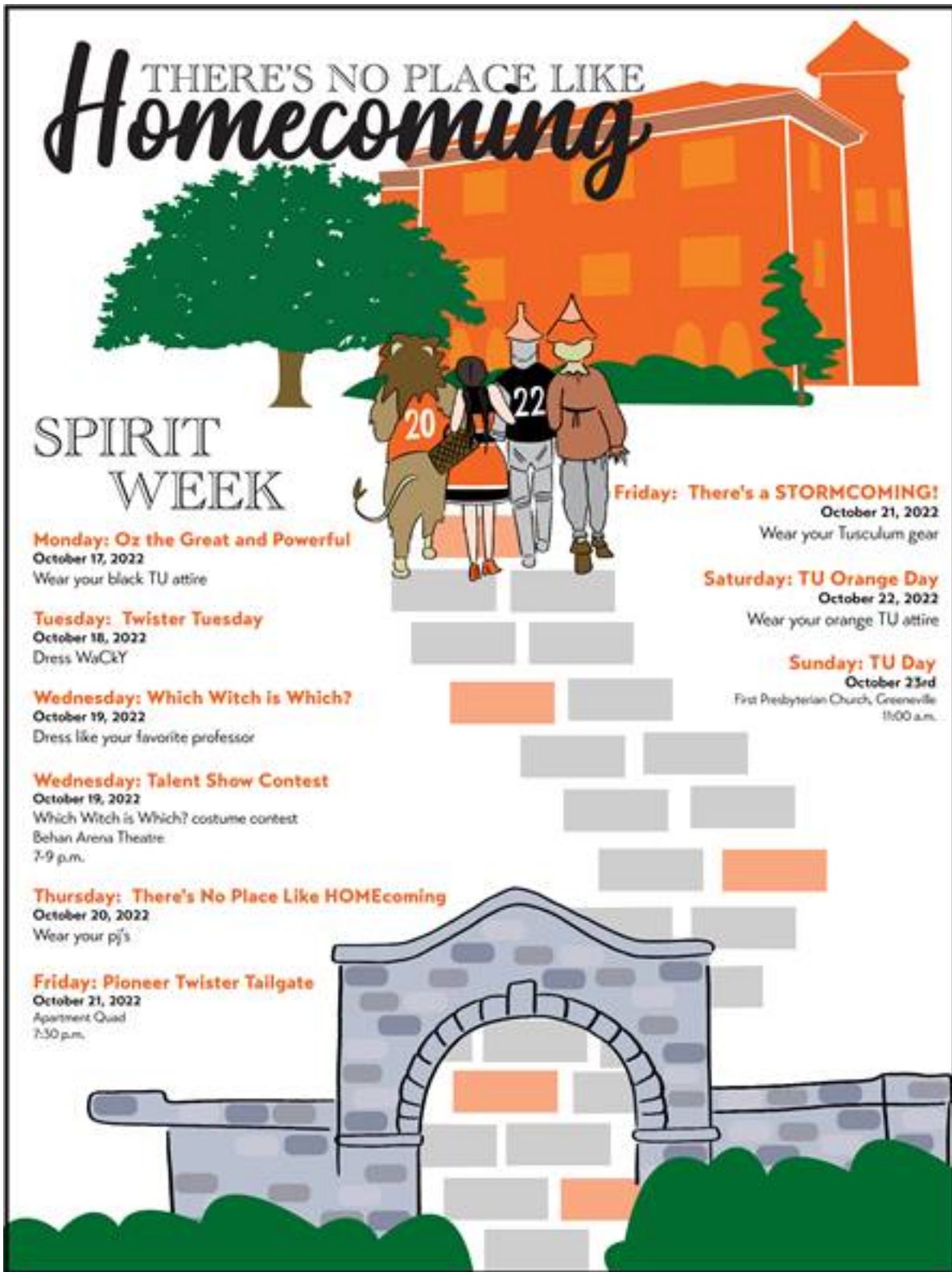
