COVID-19 procedures

We have modified a few coronavirus procedures in light of recent guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. You can read all of the protocols here.

Should you develop coronavirus symptoms, be diagnosed or be identified as a contact, you must immediately inform the appropriate group at Tusculum.

Important information about employee earnings statements

Due to a change in our payroll processing system, we have a new link for employees to view their earnings statements beginning with the pay date Sept. 15, 2022.

Earnings statements provide detail about items such as their pay, taxes, deductions, withholding status and direct deposit information. These are useful for a variety of applications and available 24/7 via the web.

You can access the new "Self-Service" portal following the link below. Your username and password will be the same credentials used for your email account.

Sign In - Ellucian Student Application (iceschools.org)

This is the same self-service portal presently used by students, advising and faculty. Once you have completed the login process, you will see a variety of headings. Earnings statements are stored under the "Employee" tab.

Certain features in self-service have yet to come online. Once new features are added, we will update you. However, some handy features are available. Some historical data for employees who worked at Tusculum prior to October 2021 remains available, such as prior year tax forms and earnings statements. You can access old data by clicking on the appropriate heading and selecting another available year.

Statements for pay dates between Oct. 15, 2021, and Aug. 31, 2022, continue to be available through our prior vendor's self-service web portal – but only for a short time. We encourage you to act fast if you wish to download these statements using the link below. We do not know how long they will be accessible, and we cannot recover them after the platform is closed.

Because statements are processed through two payroll systems within the 2022 calendar year, year-to-date information will need added together from two W-2 forms, which will be issued from each payroll system. One W-2 will cover earnings from Jan. 1, 2022-Aug. 31, 2022, while the other will cover earnings from Sept. 1, 2022-Dec. 31, 2022.

For IRS tax filing purposes, employees will need to add annual earnings together to complete their annual tax filing. We apologize, but this is unavoidable. We will provide several reminders throughout the year and as we near the issuance of W-2 tax forms, which typically occurs in January or February.

The Office of Admission has been busy visiting Tennessee high schools since the start of the fall semester, and the results so far have been extremely impressive!

Tusculum has received 425 applications so far for fall 2023, a 35 percent increase compared to a year ago! In addition, admission representatives have visited 224 Tennessee high schools in person. That represents 34% of all Tennessee high schools!

The group plans to visit every Tennessee high school in person!

Steve Schultz plays Oliver, a laid-back musician, and Erin Schultz plays Bernadette, an ambitious attorney. Frank Mengel leads set design, and three students – Todd Wallin, Josie Norton and Gracie Weems – run the show backstage.

Catch "Hocus Pocus 1" and "Hocus Pocus 2" in the Quad


Students can enjoy two installments of the same movie in one night Thursday, Sept. 29, on the Quad!

Deadline for faculty and staff to obtain reserved parking spaces

Any employee who is interested in a reserved parking space on the Greeneville campus will have until Friday, Sept. 30, to secure one.

Reserved spaces are available in the following lots:

Anyone with a reserved parking space will have exclusive access to it Monday-Friday from 7 a.m.-5 p.m. Students are never allowed to park in yellow lined spaces regardless of the hours.

Those who reserved a space for the 2021-22 academic year can keep the same location or change it for the new academic year. They and those who are reserving a space for the first time need to sign up athttps://ws.tusculum.edu/forms/tu-reserved-parking-reservation-form/. The cost for a reserved space is \$225. Employees can pay upfront or through payroll deduction.

We will strictly enforce the reserved parking space policy. If another vehicle is parked in a reserved space Monday-Friday from 7 a.m.-5 p.m., it will be towed.

Important reminders about parking regulations

We remind you that all students, faculty and staff are required to register their vehicles with the Office of Campus Safety and are required to park in their designated areas.

We also reiterate there are many places on campus where parking is not permitted and that reserved parking is in effect throughout the year.

Campus Safety will continue to issue tickets to unregistered vehicles, as well as vehicles parked outside their designated areas. To reiterate, vehicles parked in someone else's reserved spot between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. will be towed at the owner's expense.




Students can participate in Homecoming through a number of activities
