Applicable faculty and staff members only need to attend one of the sessions.


### Lecture about 9/11 coming to Tusculum

Next Monday, Dr. Troy Goodale, chair of the Social Sciences Department, will deliver a free lecture at 7 p.m. in the Meen Center lecture hall on 9/11 as part of Tusculum's Cicero Lecture Series.

In his presentation, "9/11: Numbers of Notoriety, Day of Infamy," Dr. Goodale will discuss some of the sinister acts in the years preceding that day, the rise of Al-Qaeda and the cumulative response by the United States. Specifically, he will provide background information about Al-Qaeda – its origins and its activities throughout the 1990s, including the USS Cole attack and the attack on the U.S. Embassy in Nairobi; the organization's declaration of war on America; and the nation's underestimation of the threat the group posed.

Dr. Goodale, who also serves as professor of political science, will review the events of 9/11 in detail and Al-Qaeda's preparation for the multiple attacks. In addition, he will examine the aftermath of 9/11 in U.S. foreign policy, including the nation's entry into the war in Afghanistan and the withdrawal of American troops from that country.


### Learn more about the situation in Ukraine at a free lecture

The events in Ukraine have captured everyone's attention and resulted in widespread reactions.

On Thursday, Sept. 15, the Tusculum family and the community will have an opportunity to hear directly from a man born and raised in Ukraine. Yaro Hnatusko, co-founder and executive director of Restore Ukraine, will speak at 7 p.m. in the Meen Center. The talk is free.

Restore Ukraine has converted warehouses into shelters, utilized a corporate restaurant as a food bank and distributed food for displaced citizens of Ukraine. The organization has distributed more than 500,000 pounds of food supplies in the most bombed city of Ukraine. The Johnson City Press wrote a story about Restore Ukraine's efforts in that country. ### "Lemons, Lemons, Lemons, Lemons" starting Sept. 23 at Tusculum

"Lemons, Lemons, Lemons, Lemons," a dark romantic comedy, will soon hit the stage in Annie Hogan Byrd Fine Arts Center, and all Tusculum family members are encouraged to attend!

The play will be held Sept. 23, Sept. 24, Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 at 7:30 p.m. and Sept. 25 and Oct. 2 at 2 p.m. in the Behan Arena Theatre, located on the lower level of Annie Hogan Byrd. All students, faculty and staff are eligible for one free ticket. Additional tickets cost \$15 for anyone 12-59 years old, \$12 for anyone 60 or older and \$5 for children younger than 5.

"Lemons, Lemons, Lemons, Lemons" features two characters. Bernadette is an ambitious attorney, and Oliver is a laid-back musician. A new law interrupts their love story by limiting the amount of words a citizen can speak to 140 per day.

The play by Sam Steiner considers a world in which people must say less. It contemplates what people say and how they say it. This production also touches on activism, eye contact and what people can hear in silence. The cast features two Tusculum staff members – Steve Schultz, director of admission operations, and Erin Hensley Schultz, costume director. Frank Mengel will lead set design, and three students – Todd Wallin, Josie Norton and Gracie Weems – will run the show backstage.

# Dr. Shelby Ward named the new director of the Center for Civic Advancement

We are pleased to welcome Dr. Shelby Ward as our new director of the Center for Civic Advancement and look forward to her leadership as the program continues to put our mission into action.

Dr. Ward, who also serves as an assistant professor of interdisciplinary studies, saw the position as an opportunity to combine her experiences of student organizing and engagement, as well as program coordination. She said civic engagement has been part of her academic career since graduate school.

"It is my hope I'll be able to continue the projects the Center already is known for, including Nettie Day, voter registration, Constitution Day and the clothing closet/food pantry," Dr. Ward said. "But I hope that through especially my international perspective, there are things I can add to the program, as well."

Dr. Ward previously worked for an international study abroad program that traveled with undergraduate students to Morocco and Sri Lanka for educational and civic engagement activities. She

was also an internship experience coordinator who helped place students with a local Buddhist-based nongovernmental organization in Sri Lanka that focused on social services.

Among Dr. Ward's goals for CCA are to centralize the civic engagement conducted across campus through the center, become more globally connected and secure external funding. She said the CCA has great relationships with community partners, and she hopes to further strengthen them.

"Hands down, the students are the strongest part of the CCA, particularly those of the Bonner Leaders Program," Dr. Ward said. "It is the outreach, involvement and work of the students that make the center what it is. I know that there are more students out there on campus that have similar passions and interests, and I hope we can get them more involved."

Dr. Ward also praised the work of Amanda Delbridge, who serves as the CCA's assistant director.

Dr. Ward has bachelor's and master's degrees in English and a doctorate in social, political, ethical and cultural thought, all from Virginia Tech.

### Former Israeli soldier entertained and informed his audience last week

We are grateful to Mishi Neubach, a tour guide and former Israeli soldier who fought in the Six-Day and Yom Kippur wars, who shared his insights about his country during his public lecture and presentation to Tusculum Old Testament classes Thursday, Sept. 1.

During the public event, Neubach spoke about the modern state of Israel throughout his life. At that lecture, Dr. Hummel shared about the opportunity for students, faculty and staff to visit Israel in June 2023. Dr. Hummel has used Neubach as his tour guide on all of his trips to Israel.

After that tour, students and others interested in ancient history have the opportunity to excavate at Tel-Lachish for three weeks. Academic credit can be earned during the excavation through the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Those credits are transferable to Tusculum.

For Gall, who is double majoring in studio art as well as visual communication and design, this project provided another opportunity for active and experiential learning during her Tusculum studies.




