Tusculum has a \$58.3 million annual economic impact on the region

Richard Miller, our associate vice president of institutional effectiveness, recently compiled data with assistance from other Tusculum family members that show we have a \$58.3 million annual impact on the East Tennessee economy, most prominently in Greene County.

Here is how we calculate the numbers:

- \$20 million the employment of 260 full-time equivalent employees who earn an average annual payroll of \$13.5 million and receive \$2.2 million in benefits, as well as \$4.3 million in indirect impact.
- \$20 million 2,000 Tusculum alumni living in Greene County who earn an additional \$10,000 on average in income because of their degree
- \$14.3 million \$11 million in nonsalary expenses, such as utilities, supplies, services and insurance, and \$3.3 million in indirect effects
- \$3 million \$1.6 million from the economic activity of Tusculum's 700 residential students on items such as food, clothing and supplies and \$1.4 million in economic impact from the 90,000 hours of community service by students, faculty and staff through events such as Nettie Fowler McCormick Service Day and the Pioneer Exchange, which includes the clothing closet and food pantry
- \$1 million Economic activity generated by 8,200 spectators for athletic events, 1,900 visiting athletes, 4,000 visitors for major events on campus and 500 people for campus visits to tour the university

These are conservative numbers, and we shared them with the Greene County Partnership last week to ensure the community is aware of Tusculum's importance. We will continue to review these numbers and refine them as we discover additional financial ways in which we enhance our region.

Many community and business leaders are aware of our influence on the local economy, and we hope others developed a greater understanding of Tusculum's importance. At the same time, this exercise has reinforced the many ways the community supports Tusculum, and we are grateful to have so many people standing behind us and our mission.

Two Tusculum faculty members selected to 40 Under Forty class

Congratulations to Dr. Dennis Ashford, associate professor of chemistry, and Jordan Baker, assistant professor of biology, who were selected to this year's 40 Under Forty class by The Business Journal of Tri-Cities Tennessee/Virginia.

They were recognized Friday at an awards ceremony at the Johnson City Country Club and will be featured, along with the other recipients, in the magazine's December edition. The magazine received nominations of 90 people.

The Business Journal not only takes into account professional achievements but also service to the community.

Dr. Ashford has served as a faculty member at Tusculum since 2017 and has become known for working with undergraduate students to research anti-cancer drugs. He has mentored 18 undergraduate research students. He also rewrote the chemistry program curriculum when he arrived, which has resulted in many students pursuing master's and doctoral degrees. Outside the classroom, Dr. Ashford co-founded a tech company called Fit Feed to foster community among those interested in fitness and facilitate that activity through a mobile app.

Baker has served on the Tusculum faculty since 2018. He teaches introductory biology classes by design so students are well-grounded in the fundamentals. He chairs the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee, was recently selected as the Honors Program director and is the faculty advisor for the Breaking Bread ministry. He is also involved with Audubon bird counts, helped create and design Tusculum's nature trail and collaborated on development of the Tusculum arboretum. He was also a board member and volunteer for Rural Resources in Greene County.





Homecoming week has arrived!



More spaces in parking lot next to Annie Hogan Byrd lot to go to students

Students who have completed their first year of studies at Tusculum will soon receive designated parking spaces in the parking lot between Annie Hogan Byrd Fine Arts Center and Katherine Hall.

With employees in the TRIO program moving to the Meen Center, the number of spaces needed by faculty and staff in the Annie Hogan lot has decreased. With that in mind, Dr. Hummel has concluded the two rows of parking closest to Katherine Hall will be designated solely to eligible students.

A definitive date for this conversion will be provided later, but Dr. Hummel's goal is to have the change in place by the start of November. Our Facilities Management Department will need that time to make the adjustments in parking lot striping.

This parking revision will provide extra convenience for students. Those students who are in their first year of studies at Tusculum will still need to park in the Indoor Practice Facility lot.




Chapel topic today is Bible teachings about mental health

Students can apply for debt relief during beta launch

Melissa White, our director of financial aid, provided the latest from the U.S. Department of Education about debt relief for students. Here is the message she received:

We want to invite you to be among the first to apply for student debt relief by being a tester of the online application now before we officially launch.

Soon, we will be opening the online application with our official launch. But we would like you to help us test the site by applying now during our beta test. If you submit an application during this period, it will be processed when the site officially launches. You will not need to resubmit. If you have already applied and received a confirmation email, you do not need to apply again.

Apply for debt relief now

The application is a short online form. You don't need to log in or provide any documents.

The application will be available on and off during this beta period. If you try and it's not available, try again later. Once the application officially opens later this month, it will remain open until Dec. 31, 2023.

Beware of scams!

You might be contacted by a company saying they will help you get loan discharge, forgiveness, cancellation, or debt relief for a fee. You never have to pay for help with your federal student aid. Make sure you work only with the U.S. Department of Education and our loan servicers and never reveal your personal information or account password to anyone.

Leader of excavation in Israel to speak at Tusculum

Dr. Yosef "Yossi" Garfinkel, who leads the excavation at Tel Lachish in Israel in search of Iron Age fortifications, will speak about that project at 10 a.m. Monday, Nov. 7, in the Meen Center.

Garfinkel is the Yigael Yadin Chair in Archaeology of Israel and a professor at the Institute of Archaeology, in the Biblical Department, at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. During his presentation in the Meen Center, he will share about the important work taking place at Tel Lachish. This will be important because students and others interested in ancient history are eligible to participate in the excavation for three weeks next summer.

His research interests are the Neolithic period of the Near East, the history of dance, the Chalcolithic period, and the biblical kingdom of Judah. He has excavated at numerous sites in Israel and is the author of 12 books and more than 100 articles.

Garfinkel's talk is free and open to all Tusculum family members as well as the community. We encourage you to join us for this presentation.
