## **Holy Week services to be held today through Thursday**

Now that we have entered Holy Week, Tusculum University is providing four days of services that enable all faculty, staff and students to prepare for Jesus' resurrection.

We will hold services at 3:30 p.m. Monday, April 11, through Thursday, April 14, in the chapel in Annie Hogan Byrd Fine Arts Center as well as on Zoom. The Zoom link is <https://tusculum.zoom.us/j/82929899600?pwd=cWhrYkNjWlBsUitMeUNJZGJveUlpdz09>. Please note this link is different from the one used for the weekly chapel.

All but one of the services is scheduled to last 30 minutes. The Wednesday service, which will consist of the Stations of the Cross, is set for an hour.

The services on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday will have a welcome, invocation, scripture reading, music and benediction. The main message will be delivered by Dr. Scott Hummel, Tusculum University's president, on Monday; the Rev. Dr. David Green, pastor of First Baptist Church in Greeneville, on Tuesday; and the Rev. Richard Steele, pastor of Meadow Creek Presbyterian Church in Greeneville, on Thursday.

The Rev. Dr. Kenneth Saunders, rector of St. James Episcopal Church in Greeneville, will lead the Stations of the Cross on Wednesday. If the weather is good, we will meet in front of Annie Hogan Byrd and proceed through the central part of campus to conduct the stations. If the weather is inclement, we will hold the session in the chapel inside Annie Hogan Byrd.

The complete schedule is attached to this message. We will not have a service on Friday because offices will be closed and classes will not be held in observance of Good Friday.

For just \$365 per credit hour for undergraduate courses, students can put themselves closer to earning their degree and ease their load in the spring and fall by taking summer courses. Plus, students can utilize federal financial aid to cover their tuition costs!


### **Tusculum alumnus named president of administration for the NBA**

## Another Tusculum alum earns SAC Hall of Fame honors

A Tusculum alumna who achieved impressive results on the basketball court was recently selected for induction to the South Atlantic Conference Hall of Fame.

Jasmine Gunn, a 2012 graduate, is the 10th Pioneer to earn SAC Hall of Fame status. She will enter the hall Thursday, June 2.

Gunn helped lead the women's basketball team to one of the best four-year runs in program history, including four consecutive 20-win seasons, three SAC championships, two SAC Tournament titles and four trips to the NCAA Division II Tournament. Gunn was a three-time All-American and was a finalist for National Player of the Year in 2010. She holds eight Tusculum school records and seven South Atlantic Conference marks. Her 2,180 career points are the second most in school history and fourth best in the SAC record book.

After graduation, Gunn began a successful coaching career. She is now the head basketball coach at Exceptional Education in Tennessee. She also volunteers throughout the Middle Tennessee area training area youth in basketball and is a motivational speaker to secondary schools and colleges in the state.

## **Caleb Johnson concert is just 12 days away!**



## **Shuttles for students who are flying**

Students who plan to fly home at the conclusion of the spring semester are eligible to receive shuttle service from the Greeneville campus. Tusculum provides shuttle service to Tri-Cities Airport, McGee Tyson Airport in Knoxville and the Asheville, North Carolina, Airport.

Student-athletes will need to sign up with their coaches and students who are not athletes can sign up now in the Office of Student Affairs. These shuttles will be available from Monday, May 2, through Monday, May 9.

For the fall semester, shuttle signups will begin Monday, July 25. Shuttles will be available from Monday, August 8, until Tuesday, August 18. Shuttles will run from 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. We encourage you to book flights that meet these periods, as shuttles may not be available outside these windows. If you arrive after the 7 p.m. shuttle, you should plan for overnight lodging and utilize the next morning's shuttle.

Students who are not athletes will need to email the Office of Student Affairs at [studentaffairs@tusculum.edu](mailto:studentaffairs@tusculum.edu) to schedule and confirm a shuttle time.

Students will be charged \$25 if they use the shuttle service. The cost will be added to their student account. They do not need to pay the shuttle driver.

## **President's Society applications sought**

The Office of Admission continues to accept applications from students interested in serving in the President's Society for the 2022-23 academic year.

The President's Society works closely with the Office of Admission and the President's Office to recruit students. Members of the President's Society give tours to potential students and their families on a Saturday rotation and assist in other campus visit days, open houses, new student registration and other important events on campus. ## **Another helpful message from our mental health professionals**

Timing is everything. This is a saying that evokes many thoughts for various scenarios. Often, we see the importance of timing in the life of a college student.

For example, a group of friends decides to get dinner and stays up late the night before a 9 a.m. exam the next morning. The professor has warned students that if they arrive late, they are not able to take the test and have no opportunity to make it up. In this scenario, timing is everything. Another example is related to a star athlete who is in the middle of an important game and missed the opportunity to block the winning shot by the opposing team. Again, timing is everything.

Students typically have an extremely tight schedule, with classes from morning to early evening, work and extracurricular activities leaving very little time for anything else, including necessary activities such as eating and sleeping. How about the nursing student who is in the middle of clinical rotations and classes, and has family obligations? In this scenario, time is valuable.

In addition to students in nursing programs, student-athletes have a unique challenge. They have the responsibility to perform academically, perform on the court/field with the same intensity and mental acuity, practice rigorously, train even harder and complete homework.

In working with clients, I discovered people can only perform if their timing is spot on. What does that look like? First, one must prioritize. Prioritize those things that absolutely must get done for classes. This could range anywhere from projects to papers being submitted and studying for a test.

Second, adequate nutrition is vital. These seem basic; however, in working with clients, I hear how often busy schedules prevent consistent nutrition. For some, they report having missed meals for multiple days due to a hectic schedule. A well-balanced diet will help students feel better, think with more clarity and perform better. Who doesn't want that?

Third, sunshine and Vitamin D are major influencers of mood. They make us feel better and more energized. Getting outside is critical. Our bodies and brains need the fresh air and sunlight.

Fourth, socialization and laughter are so important. People are social beings – some more than others – but most people need interaction with others.

Fifth, learn to say no and set boundaries. When a student is asked, "Hey can you give me a ride to get some food?," if he or she has to study, practice or work on a project, say no. An alternate solution can be suggested, "Sorry I can't today, but if you let me know next time in advance, I'll be glad to take you."

Finally, sleep is vital for balance and health. Too often, people, including college students, do not sleep enough. Mental and physical healing takes place at night when we rest. Timing is everything, and this includes taking care of our bodies. When we don't, our bodies will let us know, and often not in the best of circumstances. Plan ahead and remember, timing is everything.

### **Student math competition held on campus**

Last week, Tusculum hosted the Tennessee Mathematics Teachers Association mathematics competition. We welcomed students from all four Greene County high schools and Greeneville High School.

The state organization has six different contests for all high school students (or advanced younger students):

- Algebra I (includes Core/Integrated Math I)
