Remembering Dr. Donal Sexton

We are saddened to share Dr. Donal Sexton, professor emeritus of history, passed away Saturday, Aug. 13 but are pleased to celebrate his legacy at Tusculum.

Dr. Sexton served at Tusculum for 40 years and made his mark on the university. Among his many distinctions were holding the Janet Anderson Lunstet Professorship and co-authoring the bicentennial university history "Glimpses of Tusculum" in 1994. Even in retirement, he stayed active, serving as faculty marshal at graduations in a ceremonial role.

He remained a beloved figure at Tusculum, and his name would periodically arise in discussions about the university.

His work in the 1980s directing a two-year research project that included interviews of residents who lived in the Horse Creek community of Greene County gained renewed attention in the last year. A new group of faculty and students have returned to Horse Creek to conduct a follow-up study. Dr. Katherine Everhart, assistant professor of sociology, and Dr. Peter Noll, professor of public history and museum studies, interviewed him in the spring about the earlier study.

Dr. David Bow, who is beginning his 46th year at Tusculum, described Dr. Sexton as having very high academic standards for his students. He called Dr. Sexton a leader among the faculty and said his former colleague would not hesitate to share his thoughts on subjects. He highlighted Dr. Sexton's work with others on the former block schedule, civic arts and self-governance.

"I respected him a great deal because of his knowledge in his field and the standards he held for his students," Dr. Bow said.

Israeli to speak at Tusculum and in the community

Mishi Neubach, a former Israeli soldier who fought in the Six-day and Yom Kippur wars, will speak in Old Testament classes on campus Thursday, Sept. 1 and conduct a free lecture that evening in the Meen Center lecture hall.

Neubach has been a friend of Dr. Hummel for 24 years. He is a tour guide, who Dr. Hummel has used for all of his trips to Israel, including the visit this summer. He is a graduate of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, where Dr. Hummel also studied.

During his visit to Tusculum, Neubach will have a reunion and dinner Wednesday, Aug. 31, at the President's House with all of the people who traveled to Israel in June. After speaking to the Old Testament classes, he will have lunch in the Hurley Room of the cafeteria at noon, and faculty, staff and students are welcome to attend.

The lecture at the Meen Center will be held at 7 p.m.

"His lecture will address the life of the modern state of Israel through his life," Dr. Hummel said. "He was born one year before the establishment of the modern state of Israel, and his life somewhat models the progress of the state. His family is typical of those who came from Europe before and after World War II. He fought in two wars and has grown up with the state."

university through a holistic approach and prepare them to be career-ready professionals. We are also excited Chuck will partner with her to provide the framework for our students to grow and succeed. He has proven throughout his time at Tusculum to be a valuable asset in helping students reach their full potential.”

Hensley outlined three main goals:

- Continue Tusculum's efforts to hone and craft specific processes for identifying and supporting students of concern
- Expand opportunities for student leadership and the development of leadership skills our Pioneers to embody the university’s mission
- Lead a strong team of student affairs professionals, who develop relationships with students and foster a sense of belonging and personal success for all of them

“Tusculum has an incredible culture of care embedded within its campus community,” Hensley said. “Students are consistently supported by faculty, staff and coaches, who desire to see all students succeed in their studies and fulfill all aspects of the university's mission.”

Sutton’s goals include developing student leaders and maintaining a consistently positive culture by collaborating with community stakeholders and multiple departments.

“Our students are resilient and believe in having a voice to speak or express themselves,” Sutton said. “They want to express themselves showing that they are important. Our students are servant leaders, helping our community and volunteering their time.”

Longtime economics professor to coordinate undergraduate business programs

Dr. Antônio Bós, professor of economics and one of our longest-serving faculty members, has been named program coordinator of undergraduate business programs.

A Tusculum family member since 1993, Dr. Bós was promoted to full professor in 2007. He has taught a wide range of bachelor's and master's courses, including Economic Environment of Organizations, International Economic Development, Managerial Economics and Advanced Marketing Management.

The Bachelor of Science in business administration degree offers six majors – accounting, economics, entrepreneurship, information technology, management and marketing. It is part of the College of Business, which is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs and under the university's umbrella accreditation with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. The College of Business has achieved numerous national rankings in recent years.

“It is a pleasure to entrust Dr. Bós with this position, and I am confident he will produce outstanding results,” said Dr. Kevin Hill, interim dean of the College of Business. “Dr. Bós is a pillar of the university, and his commitment to the preparation of our students as career-ready professionals is exceptional. The breadth and depth of his experience and scholarship will ensure we continue to excel as a leader in business education.”

Dr. Bós has been published extensively, has written multiple scholarly reviews and has conducted about two dozen presentations at professional events. He has received many honors for his professional work at Tusculum.

He is serving at the College of Business' liaison to the Quality Enhancement Plan and as a member of the Institutional Review Board. During his years at Tusculum, he has held several leadership posts, including chair of the Admissions and Standards Committee, director of the Center for Economic Development and Entrepreneurship and chair of the Business Administration Department.

Dr. Bós holds a bachelor's degree in agronomics and a master's degree in agricultural economics from Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil, and a doctorate in economics from the University of Tennessee. He was a post-doctoral fellow in the Department of International Health of the Bloomberg School of Public Health at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore.
