COVID-19 protocols for this year

As we enter the 2022-23 academic year, the coronavirus is still present in East Tennessee and in other parts of the nation and world.

We encourage Tusculum family members to practice important measures to help protect themselves and others against the coronavirus, such as frequent hand washing and coughing into the crook of their arm. They should also not come to class in person or to the office if they have been diagnosed with the coronavirus or are experiencing symptoms that are not typical of their everyday experiences. It is particularly important that they stay home if their temperature exceeds 100.4 degrees.

Here are the essential protocols for this year:

- Face coverings are generally not required, but Tusculum family members are welcome to wear one if they choose.
- Residential students who test positive will be encouraged to return home, but if that is not possible, they will be isolated in another part of campus.
- All Tusculum family members who test positive must isolate for at least five days. On Day 6, they will be allowed to return to work or come out of isolation housing if they have been fever-free for at least 24 hours and are not experiencing other major symptoms. However, they must wear a face covering except when they are in their room or office through Day 10. Student-athletes should notify their athletic trainer for further guidance.
- Contacts who are fully vaccinated and boosted do not have to quarantine unless they experience symptoms, but they should take a coronavirus test after five days if they are not symptomatic and earlier if they are symptomatic.
- Facilities management staff will continue to spray classrooms at least once a day to kill potential viruses.
- We will hold in-person classes, but faculty members will work with students who are positive or a contact and cannot come to class.
- Community members and relatives of Tusculum faculty, staff and students should not come to campus if they are sick, feeling symptoms of the coronavirus or have been diagnosed. They should also not come to campus if they are not fully vaccinated and boosted and are a contact.

Should you develop coronavirus symptoms, be diagnosed or be identified as a contact, you must immediately inform the appropriate group at Tusculum.

- Students need to email the Office of Student Affairs at studentaffairs@tusculum.edu or call the COVID-19 hotline at 423-636-0500. They should also alert their professors.
- Employees must contact the Human Resources Department at humanresources@tusculum.edu or 423-636-7345 (extension 5345 on campus) as well as their supervisor.

On-campus health clinic opens Aug. 22

The Ballad Health Tusculum University Clinic located in Room 008 of the Meen Center will open for medical care Monday, Aug. 22.

The clinic will see patients Mondays and Wednesdays from 8-11:30 a.m. and Thursdays from 1-3:30 p.m. No appointment is necessary. Patients can self-pay or use their health insurance. Students can apply for payment aid, if necessary.

Alice Lawson, a family nurse practitioner and an assistant professor of nursing at Tusculum, delivers care in the clinic.

Students, faculty and staff, as well as the immediate family members of Tusculum employees, are eligible to receive care at the clinic. Services include:

- Treatment for colds and flu, including fever, sore throat and cough
- General dermatology care
- Care for Infections, such as those in the sinus, eye/ear and urinary tract
- Management of chronic conditions
- Preventive care/wellness exams

- Specialist referrals

The clinic also provides testing for the coronavirus, flu and strep throat.

Navigating traffic for graduation

In addition to graduation Saturday morning, Jogging for Jess, a 5K fundraiser will be taking place in the campus area, so we encourage you to exercise additional caution if you are going to be at Tusculum.

The attached map shows all of the open routes in green and closed routes in red that will be in place from 7-45-9:20 a.m. Saturday.

At the bottom of the map are directions for entering campus from various directions, a list of the roads that will be closed and directions for accessing the Annie Hogan Byrd Fine Arts Center and Meen Center parking lots. All campus parking lots will be open for commencement except for the Indoor Practice Facility, and all will be accessible via normal routes except the following:

- The Annie Hogan Byrd lot will only be accessible via the roadway behind Katherine Hall in the northbound direction.
- The Meen lot will only be accessible via the southbound lane of Shiloh turning left at the cross street heading toward the football field.

Remember we have a new, online bookstore model. Students can access the online bookstore at tusculum.textbookx.com. They can log into the website with their student email account to see a personalized page of the courses for which they registered and the course materials their professors have assigned. They can select from the new, used, rental and eBook options, and they can choose textbooks from third-party marketplace merchants and students around the country at heavily discounted prices.

We still sell branded merchandise such as clothing items, flags, key chains, school supplies and snacks in the Scott M. Niswonger Commons. However, textbooks are no longer available there.

Coming soon: enhanced Wi-Fi and internet connection!

We have great news for students! To accommodate today's entertainment needs, Tusculum is doubling its available bandwidth! Starting in early September, we will launch better and faster speeds for Wi-Fi and Ethernet connections! We are pleased to strengthen the technology on campus! We are sure you will love it!

To ensure everyone can enjoy these amazing connection speeds, we ask students not to bring routers or devices with built-in routers, such as wireless printers. These devices slow the internet connection for everyone. Students might not be able to download their favorite shows, for example, if someone has a wireless router in a gaming console. If students wonder whether their device might have one of these routers, they should not hesitate to ask. We will be happy to help!

We respond to the entertainment needs and patterns of our students. After careful consideration, we have concluded provision of cable television is no longer beneficial due to a decrease in use and demand. As a result, we will discontinue cable service on campus effective Wednesday, Aug. 31.

However, we will equip the televisions in student lounges with streaming devices so students can log into their favorite streaming services in The Pioneer Perk, the Katherine Hall lobby and other student lobbies across campus.

Time for employees to register vehicles and secure reserved parking spaces

All faculty and staff need to register any vehicles they will park on campus and request reserved parking spaces that might interest them.

Faculty and staff members will not have to pay a registration fee for the first vehicle, but the cost is \$20 for each additional vehicle. To register their vehicle, they must visit <https://www.permitsales.net/TusculumU>. Once they are registered, they can go to Campus Safety to pick up their sticker. The penalty for parking an unregistered vehicle is \$75 per citation.

Anyone securing a reserved parking space will have exclusive access to it Monday-Friday from 7 a.m.-5 p.m. Students are never allowed to park in yellow lined spaces regardless of the hours.

Those who reserved a space for the 2021-22 academic year can keep the same location or change it for the new academic year. They and those who are reserving a space for the first time need to sign up at <https://ws.tusculum.edu/forms/tu-reserved-parking-reservation-form/>. The cost for a reserved space is \$225. Employees can pay upfront or through payroll deduction.

We will strictly enforce the reserved parking space policy. If another vehicle is parked in a reserved space Monday-Friday from 7 a.m.-5 p.m., it will be towed. Campus Safety will issue no tickets or warnings except during the first two weeks of each semester.

New chair for the Sport Management Department

Dr. Nick Davidson, an assistant professor of sport management, has been named chair of this growing department.

A Tusculum family member for a year, Dr. Davidson teaches bachelor's and master's sport management courses. They include Sport Facilities and Design/Event Management, Communication in Sport and Legal Issues in Sport.

"We are thrilled to elevate Dr. Davidson to chair of these well-designed and well-developed programs," said Dr. Kevin Hill, interim dean of the College of Business. "He will build on their many strengths and national recognition to ensure our graduates continue to be equipped as career-ready professionals, I look forward to witnessing growth in these programs with him at the helm."

Dr. Davidson inherits undergraduate and graduate programs that received accreditation in the spring from the Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Program. The programs also have this designation under the university's umbrella accreditation with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. In addition, onlinemastersdegrees.org ranked Tusculum 12th in a listing of the Best Online Master's in Sports Management for 2022.

Along with his teaching responsibilities, Dr. Davidson oversaw development of the Tusculum esports team, which will compete nationally in the fall. He also led the project that produced the TU esports lab in COG complex.

Dr. Davidson has participated in several peer-reviewed journal articles and conference presentations. His research interests are organizational and consumer behavior in sport, labor economics in sport, organizational leadership in sport and globalization and production of combat sports.

Dr. Davidson holds a Bachelor of Science and a Master of Science in sport management from West Virginia University and a doctorate in that field, with a concentration in sport media and culture studies from Florida State University.

Still not registered for fall courses? Take care of it today!

The fall semester starts in two weeks, and students should be sure they are registered for classes. They can review courses available during the fall semester by visiting the portal and submit [registration forms](#) to the Registrar's Office at registrartu@tusculum.edu.

Students need to remember:

- They must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses.
- They must not have a business office hold on their student account because they will not be able to register for courses until they resolve it.



Don't forget about housing for the fall semester!

The Office of Student Affairs is completing housing assignments, so students who want to live in a residence hall or the apartments for the fall semester need to act now.

Keep in mind these important reminders about housing registration:

- Students will not be able to participate in the housing lottery if they have not registered for courses to be held in the fall.
- Students need to complete a housing application on their Anthology accounts.
- Students who have a business office hold can submit their housing application, but it will not be processed until they register for classes for the fall.
