Change in coronavirus procedure

One of the more pleasant developments in the global coronavirus pandemic has been the recent change in Greene County from high transmission to low transmission. This is definitely good news, which should be helpful for faculty, staff and students as they participate in activities in the community.

Based on the reduction in cases and in harmony with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, we will further modify our coronavirus procedures. Face coverings will no longer be required in any setting in any of our facilities, effective immediately. If a person chooses to wear a face covering, that is perfectly acceptable, but that decision will be left solely to each individual.

You should continue taking appropriate safety measures, such as not coming to class in person or to work when ill. We strongly encourage everyone to be vaccinated and to receive a booster against the coronavirus.

We appreciate everyone's actions to reduce the potential for spreading the coronavirus within the Tusculum family. We hope to see further reduction in the coronavirus and quick healing for those who still might be diagnosed.

Dr. Van Amberg has served as a Tusculum professor since 2005 and as an administrator since 2006. He is a historian of 16th century Europe and the author of "A Real Presence: Religious and Social Dynamics of the Eucharistic Conflicts in Early Modern Augsburg 1520-1530."

He delivered the lectures for Tusculum's Theologian-In-Residence series in 2018 to commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. He discussed the Renaissance and Reformation as the featured presenter for Tusculum's Cicero Lecture Series in March 2021.

Dr. Van Amberg holds a Bachelor of Arts in religious studies from Bowdoin College, a Master of Arts in church history from Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary and a doctorate in European history from 800-1648 from the University of Arizona.

Next Monday, we will return exclusively to Zoom as we hold a memorial service for Stefanie Henry, an ARCHES employee in Knoxville, who passed away in October from the coronavirus.

It is important for students to remember:

- They must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses.
- They will not be able to register for courses if they have a business office hold on their student account.
- They will not be able to participate in the housing lottery the week of April 4 if they do not register for courses to be held in the fall.

Do not forget about the opportunity to take courses in the summer!

Students, do you want to ease your load during the fall and spring semesters or complete a really hard course when your academic calendar is a little lighter? Take advantage of our summer sessions!

Registration is already underway for the summer terms through Anthology. We currently have three summer sessions.

- Full May 16-Aug. 12
- · Early May 16-June 24
- · Late June 27-Aug. 12

Please remember a few key requirements about summer registration are similar to the fall semester. You cannot register for the summer terms if you have a business hold. In addition, you need to meet with your advisor before starting the registration process.

Director of bands performing recital on campus

The recital will begin with Dr. Gonzalez performing "Cyberspace," written by Peter Graham, and be followed by a euphonium concerto that consists of three pieces – "Agito," "Quasi nocturne" and "Maestro, energico," all written by Jukka Linkola.

Following an intermission, Dr. Gonzalez will embark on three tangos – "Milonga del Angel," "Invierno Porteño" and "Adiós Nonino," written by Astor Pantaleón Piazzolla and arranged by Øystein Baadsvik.

Next, he will play "Pure Imagination" from "The World's Greatest Storyteller" by Philip Harper and arranged by Dr. Gonzalez.

The performance will conclude with Dr. Gonzalez's performance of "Napoli," written by Herman Bellstedt and arranged by Frank Simon.

Dr. Gonzalez said the music will tie into the pandemic by first conveying the challenging emotions, such as void, people have experienced. Later in the recital, the music will shift to a more upbeat tone, reflecting people's return to a more traditional routine as the pandemic eases.

Director of academic advising selected as chair of international association

We are pleased to share that Jill Oberfeitinger, director of academic advising, has been named as chair of the Small Colleges and Universities Advising Community.

NACADA is an international association of professional advisors, counselors, faculty, administrators and students working to enhance the educational development of students. The association has more than 12,000 members representing all states in the United States, Puerto Rico, Canada and several other international countries.

Members represent higher education institutions across the spectrum of Carnegie classifications and include professional advisors/counselors, faculty, administrators and students whose responsibilities include academic advising.

Oberfeitinger's two-year term begins in October, and she is now completing the unexpired term of her predecessor.

"I hope to make the voice of advisors at small colleges and universities have a bigger presence in the national and international field," Oberfeitinger said. "Each institution may not individually work with many students, but in total we do. I hope to accomplish this in two ways – first, by having a more visible presence for our members and to increase the number of members and, second, by providing multiple and different professional development opportunities for advisors at small colleges and universities."

In addition to chairing NACADA meetings, Oberfeitinger will including working with different advising community groups, proposal readings and encouragement of others in the community.

"It is truly an honor to be elected and to have support of the SCUAC steering committee and our provost, Dr. Tricia Hunsader," Oberfeitinger said. "This opportunity was a leap of faith, but I am truly excited about the opportunities that it can open up for advisors at other small colleges and universities, Tusculum and myself."

Oberfeitinger has served as a Tusculum staff member since 1994, beginning as an admissions counselor for 11 years before transitioning to her current role, which she has held since 2005. She also earned her bachelor's degree in biology and mathematics, a minor in music and a master's degree in adult education, all from Tusculum.

In addition to her day job, Oberfeitinger is known for singing the Alma Mater at graduations, and she has been a chorus member for the Knoxville Opera Company since 1996.

Computer science faculty member speaks with high school students

During our Spring Break, Walter Wimberly, an assistant professor of computer science, connected with students at Chuckey-Doak High School in Greene County to discuss a variety of subjects that pertain to the field he teaches.

Wimberly spoke to two classes, telling them how back-end programmers use data collected on e-commerce sites to provide the modern experience in online shopping, including product recommendations and sorting of search results. This discussion branched into a conversation about the way server-side programming affects other aspects of our lives, including search results from Google, voice assistants and self-driving cars.

Students asked Wimberly questions about the ethics of data use and what can and cannot be tracked. They were also curious about what they needed to know before entering college as a computer science major. They also inquired about what the hot topics are in computer science, such as cybersecurity and had some other general questions about college.

During his time at Chuckey-Doak, the class' teacher provided information about Tusculum and its proximity to the high school. Wimberly highlighted Tusculum's smaller size and the personalized experience students have with their professors.

We thank Wimberly for taking time during the break to engage with these students and hope to see them as Pioneers when they graduate from Chuckey-Doak!
