Key schedule changes for Spring Break

No classes will take place this week due to Spring Break. Faculty members will be off all week, and staff members will not work Thursday or Friday. Here are a couple of other key pieces of information you might need to know during this period, when the number of people on campus will be greatly reduced:

- Chapel will not be held today.
- The cafeteria is closed until dinner Sunday, March 13, and Chick-fil-A is closed until Monday, March 14.
- The Thomas J. Garland Library will be open 8 a.m.-5 p.m. today through Wednesday and then be closed until Monday, March 14.
- The Ballad Health Tusculum University Clinic will be closed all week and reopen Monday, March 14.
- The bookstore will be closed Thursday and Friday.
- The Post Office on campus will be closed Thursday through Sunday.

In preparation for Spring Break, the Student Government Association voted to allocate \$500 to further stock the Food Pantry, which is located on the ground floor of the Meen Center across from the Center for Academic Success and Tutoring. Students who are staying on campus this week are encouraged to visit the food pantry and take any items they need.

Pantry sponsors are the Bonner Leader Program; the tutoring center; the Center for Civic Advancement; the College of Nursing; the College of Science, Technology and Mathematics; the Office of Student Affairs; faculty; and staff. The College of Nursing; the College of Science, Technology and Math; and the tutoring center started the pantry, and the CCA now stocks and manages it.

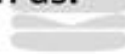

The Chili Cook-Off is right around the corner!

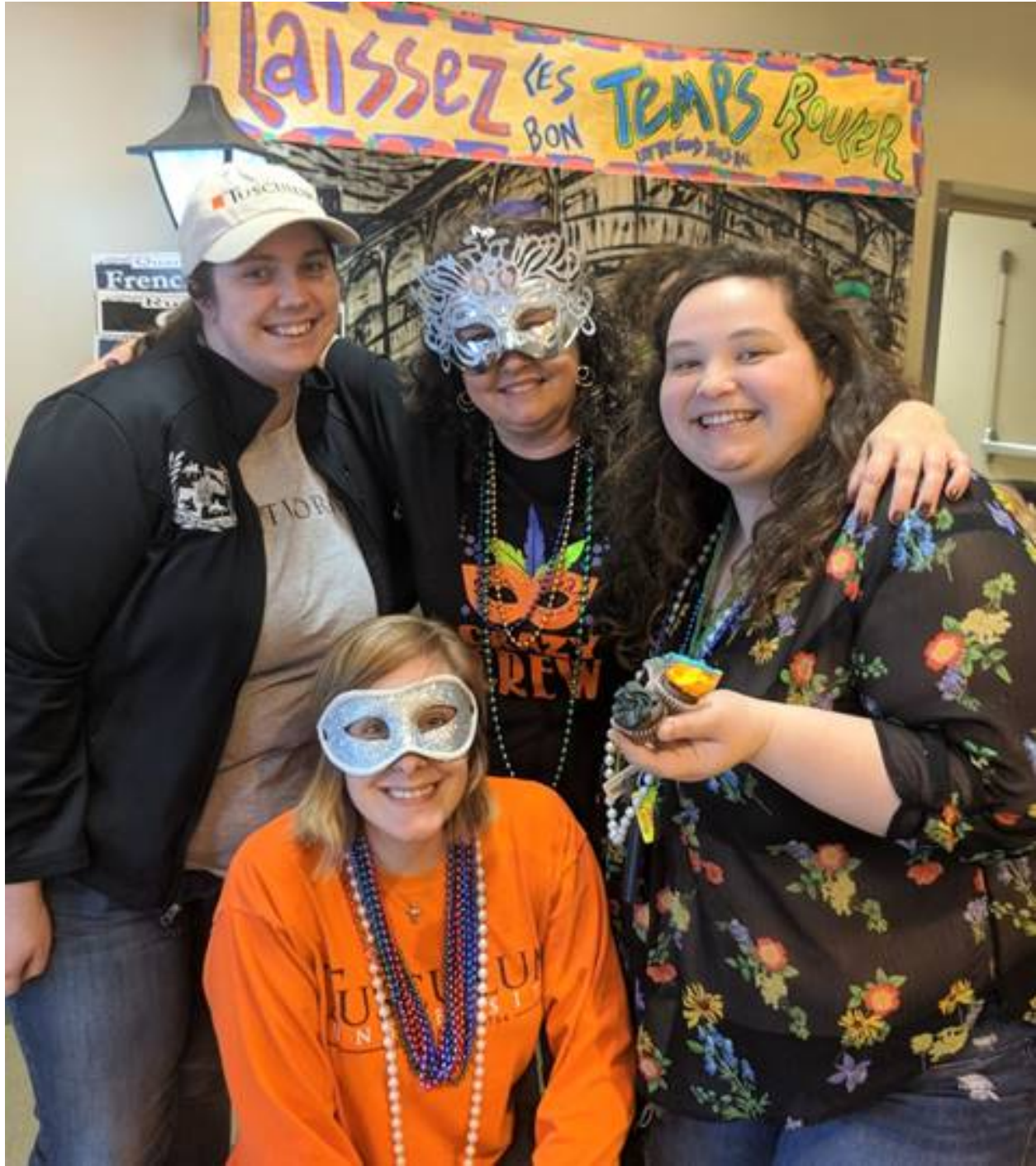
There is no need to pack a lunch or find a restaurant for lunch Thursday, March 17, because chili will be the main item on the menu at Tusculum!

Reminder about registration for the fall semester

Starting today, students can review the courses available during the fall semester and start making plans with their advisor for that term. Students must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses. Advisors will be happy to assist, so students should make contact as soon as possible.

We remind students that they should ensure they do not have a business office hold on their student account. Students will not be able to register for courses with a hold, so we urge them to take any steps necessary to resolve that. Representatives in the business office can help students with any questions.

Students will not be able to participate in the housing lottery the week of April 4 if they do not register for courses to be held in the fall.

Registration for the fall semester will be held the week of March 28. Here is the schedule when students can start registering that week.

- Monday, March 28 – Adult and Online Studies program students and graduate students
- Tuesday, March 29 – seniors, veterans and honors students
- Wednesday, March 30 – juniors
- Thursday, March 31 – sophomores
- Friday, April 1 – first-year students

Register now for summer classes

One of the best ways for students to expedite their path to graduation or ease their load in the fall or spring semester is to take courses during the summer. This is an optimal time to complete a course that could potentially be challenging.

Registration is underway for the summer terms through Anthology. We currently have three summer terms.

- Full – May 16-Aug. 12
- Early – May 16-June 24
- Late – June 27-Aug. 12

As is the case with fall semester registration, students will not be able to register for the summer terms if they have a business hold. In addition, students need to meet with their advisor before starting the registration process.

The students' login to the Student Portal is their Tusculum lab account. This is the same username and password that is used to log into Canvas.

Two Tusculum students who are members of the Debate Team recently competed at the Tennessee Valley Invitational, which was held at Pellissippi State Community College in Knoxville.

Sophomores Zurich Hudson, a communication major, and Josie Norton, a communication major, with a concentration in theater, competed against six teams in a round-robin tournament. Our Pioneers finished with a record of 2-2, and Hudson placed as an individual speaker.

Dr. Kurtis Miller, chair of the communication and Fine Arts Department and an assistant professor of communication, said the Debate Team was temporarily inactive during the global coronavirus pandemic because most of the debate circuit in East Tennessee was closed. This was the first major in-person tournament since the pandemic's onset, and it was nice to once again participate, he said.

The Debate Team is a student club that meets from 3:30-5 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays in Thomas J. Garland Library Room 105. Students can also choose to participate in debate for credit by enrolling in either COMM 120, Debate Team Practicum (one hour), or COMM 220, Argumentation and Debate (three hours). COMM 220 can be used to satisfy the general education program's COMM/SPCH requirement.
