Leader of excavation in Israel with ties to biblical history speaks today in Meen

Dr. Yosef "Yossi" Garfinkel, a guest of Dr. Hummel, will discuss in the Meen Center lecture hall at 10 a.m. Monday, Nov. 7, the excavation he leads at Tel Lachish in Israel in search of Iron Age fortifications.

The timing of this presentation aligns nicely with an opportunity in summer 2023 for students and others interested in ancient history. They may be eligible to participate in the Tel Lachish excavation for

three weeks in the summer of 2023. Students who qualify will receive three academic credit hours at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, and those will transfer to Tusculum.

If you want to participate in that project, learn more about events in the Bible or simply learn what is happening elsewhere the world, Dr. Garfinkel's talk will be excellent for you.

Dr. Garfinkel is the Yigael Yadin Chair in Archaeology of Israel and a professor at the Institute of Archaeology, in the Biblical Department, at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. He is the author of 12 books and more than 100 articles.

We encourage you to receive your flu vaccination today.

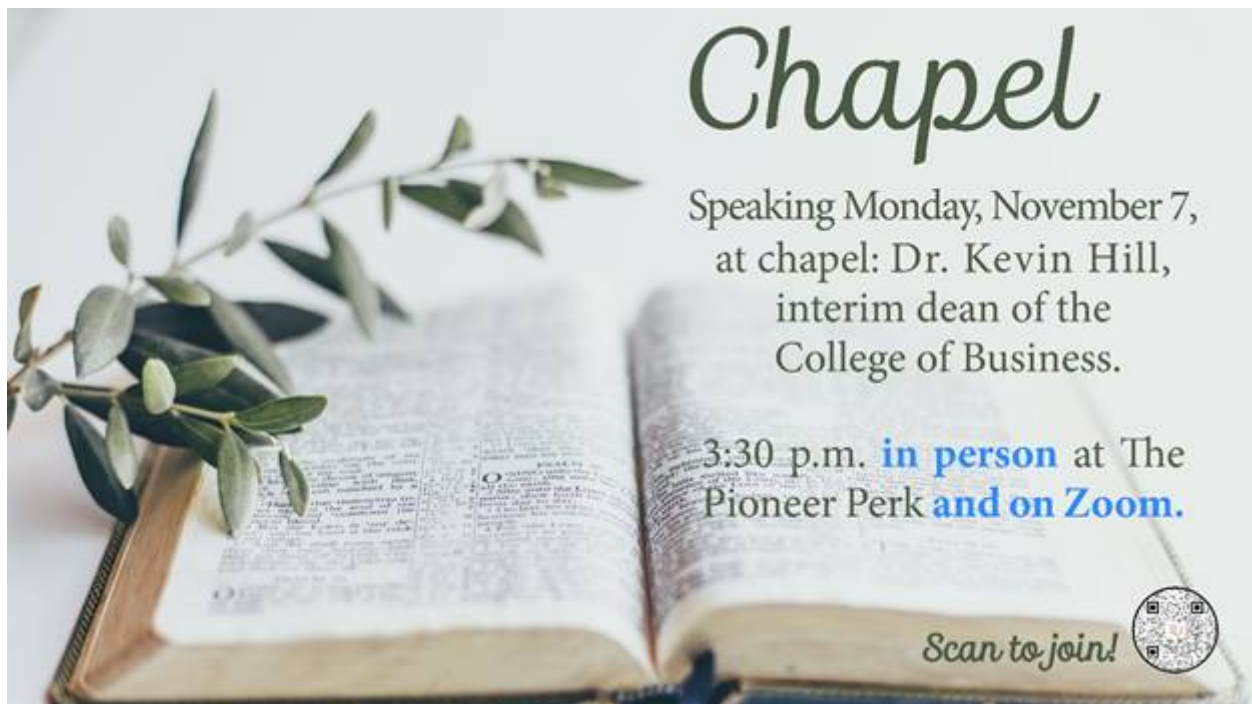
Today's chapel topic: "Why should I follow Jesus?"

Minister to share her experience engaging in public issues

The Rev. Dr. Leah Schade, an ordained minister in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, will discuss at the Breaking Bread ministry meeting Monday, Nov. 7, at 6:30 p.m. how she engages in public issues and community organizing on subjects such as fracking and climate change.

She will talk about how her Lutheran background informed her work, how she handled pushback from parishioners who disagreed with her and what helped her overcome discouragement. Her story provides a glimpse into the theological and biblical foundations that impact her public engagement on social issues.

The Rev. Dr. Schade is the associate professor of preaching and worship at Lexington Theological Seminary in Lexington, Kentucky and has been ordained for 20 years. She earned both her Master of Divinity and doctorate degrees from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now United Lutheran Seminary).

She has pastored three Pennsylvania congregations in suburban, urban and rural contexts. She has written two books and co-edited another.

Breaking Bread meets at 6:30 p.m. Mondays in Room 300 of the Meen Center. The Rev. Dr. Schade will speak to that room via Zoom.

Support the United Way of Greene County campaign

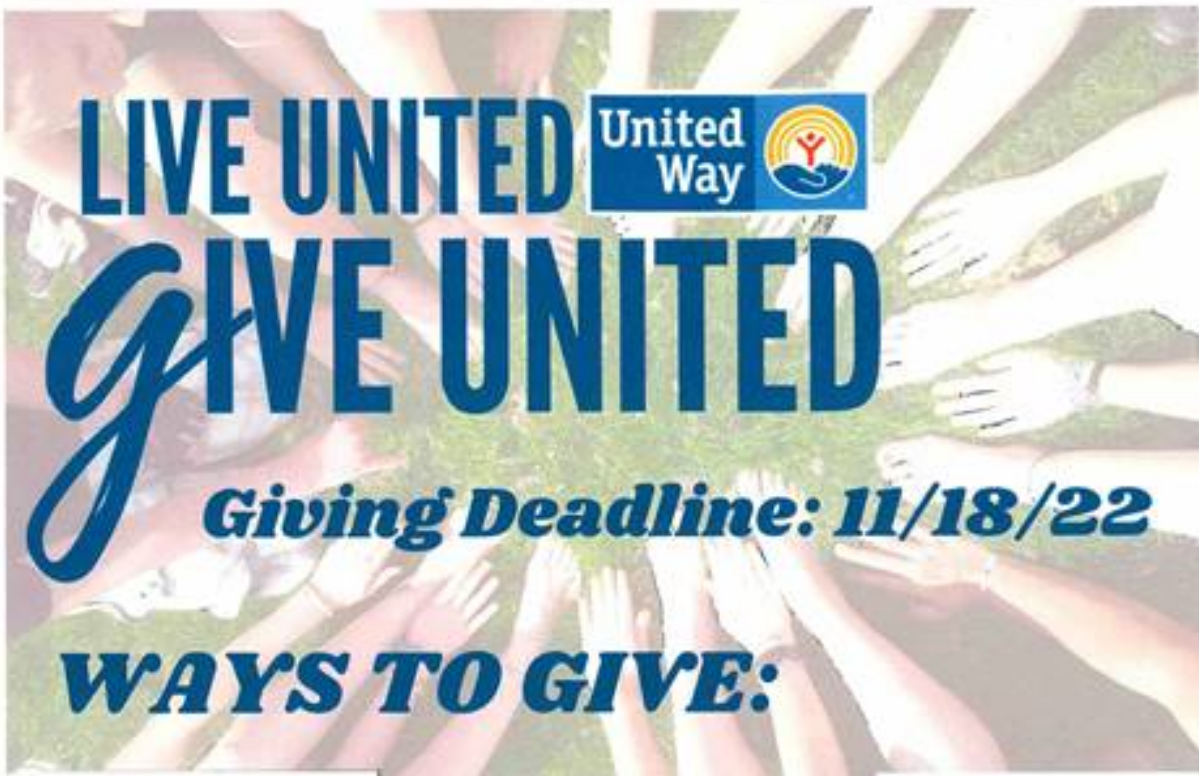
Faculty and staff members should have received a pledge form through campus mail to support the United Way of Greene County, but it also available online through the QR code in the picture below.

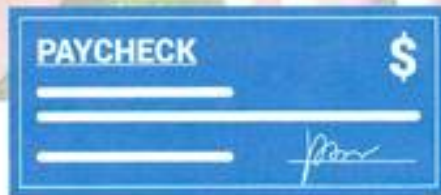

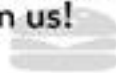
