This is the final week for faculty and staff members to make their pledge in support of the United Way of Greene County. The deadline is Friday, Nov. 18.


Employees should have received a pledge form through campus mail, but it also available online through the QR code in the picture below.

# Zambian poet performing a reading this week at Tusculum

The Tusculum Review, the university's international literary journal, will host the winner of its 2022 Poetry Chapbook Prize, Zambian poet Mubanga Kalimamukwento, at 7 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 17, in Behan Arena Theatre on the lower level of Annie Hogan Byrd.

Kalimamukwento will conduct a reading, answer questions and participate in a reception celebrating the publication of her chapbook "unmarked graves." She describes the collection as "conversations with ghosts," and she contemplates the loss of her closest family members to the AIDS epidemic in Zambia.

Copies of the limited edition chapbook, which includes illustrations by Amiah Brown, will be available for sale that night and will be signed by Kalimamukwento. In addition, the Tusculum Band will play adapted and improvised compositions.

Kalimamukwento delves into other writing genres as well. Her first novel, "The Mourning Bird," won the Dinaane Debut Fiction Award and was also listed among the 15 most notable books of 2019 by Brittle Paper, an online literary magazine. 

We look forward to an evening of spiritual enrichment as we prepare for Christmas.




Minister from the community delivering today's chapel message
