Message from the chair of the Board of Trustees

When the Tusculum Board of Trustees meets in October during Homecoming activities, we have a very busy weekend on campus. Board business and all the alumni and Homecoming events have us going early morning to late at night. When I fly home, I am tired, but in a good way.

As I reflect on last week's Board meeting, I come away very encouraged. Yes, we all know that our enrollment is down. This outcome puts financial pressure on budgets across the university. Dr. Hummel and the President's Cabinet have done great work in finding ways to mitigate some of that pressure. The Board of Trustees is working hard to take actions in our control to improve financials. In fact, every trustee is taking action in their sphere of influence to help provide Tusculum what it needs to fully relieve this short-term financial pressure.

I am encouraged because in the board meeting we saw the leading indicators of a brighter enrollment future in the near term. Our admissions team has already visited over three-fourths of all high schools in Tennessee. They target to visit ALL of them this year. This renewed exposure for Tusculum already has our applications up by 33%. This will lead to a much better fall '23.

I am encouraged that our campus has become more student friendly with the addition of The Pioneer Perk and the Wellness Center. Every time I walked by these amenities, students were actively using them. I am encouraged by the strengthening of our Student Affairs office as well as the addition of a campus minister. Early evidence shows improved retention of students who otherwise might leave us after the fall semester. As students feel supported and have a better experience on campus, they both tend to stay here and tell their friends about us.

I am encouraged with early progress in our new fundraising program to provide short-term gap scholarships for current and prospective students. Donors are responding to this appeal, and students **who otherwise have financial barriers to returning** will be able to re-enroll in the spring. I am encouraged by the work to renew the Tusculum band program and am confident this program will grow steadily semester by semester. Band can bring both enrollment and new excitement to games and other campus activities.

Dr. Joel Van Amberg reminded the trustees in his address as faculty chair that renewal requires a remembrance of our roots and the lofty principles that guided those who founded our institution. Tusculum's founders actively made a difference for their students — one by one— by creating a caring Christian educational environment that helped students strengthen in mind, soul and body.

Yes, renewal is necessary and I am encouraged because renewal is already underway. I can honestly say that every Tusculum family member I know in the faculty, administrative staff, coaching staff, facilities staff and Board of Trustees care deeply about our students. All want each student to graduate and leave Tusculum as both a better person and a better servant of the community where they will live. Our founders would be proud of this fact, and they are in a sense cheering us on as we embrace more fully that calling. We have a worthy mission. And I appreciate every one of the Tusculum family who dedicates themselves to achieving this goal for our students.

I can't wait to see even more progress when I return to campus in February!

- Monday, Oct. 24 – Graduate, veterans, Adult and Online studies, and honor students
- Tuesday, Oct. 25 – Seniors
- Wednesday, Oct. 26 – Juniors
- Thursday, Oct. 27 – Sophomores
- Friday, Oct. 28 – First-year students

Students need to remember:

- They must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses.
- They must not have a business office hold on their student account because they will not be able to register for courses until they resolve it.

Tusculum hosting leader of excavation in Israel Nov. 7

Mark your calendar for 10 a.m. Monday, Nov. 7, for a fascinating discussion by Dr. Yosef "Yossi" Garfinkel in the Meen Center lecture hall about the excavation he leads at Tel Lachish in Israel in search of Iron Age fortifications.

Garfinkel is the Yigael Yadin Chair in Archaeology of Israel and a professor at the Institute of Archaeology, in the Biblical Department, at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. During his presentation in the Meen Center, he will share about the important work taking place at Tel Lachish. This will be valuable because students and others interested in ancient history are eligible to participate in the excavation for three weeks next summer.

In the first part of his academic research he specialized on the late prehistory of the Levant, the Pottery Neolithic and Chalcolithic periods.

Since 2007 he has concentrated his research on the early, heavily debated, phases of the Kingdom of Judah, in the 10th and 9th centuries BCE. He conducted excavations and surveys at Khirbet Qeiyafa, Socoh, Tel Lachish and Khirbet al-Rai. New data on the early kings of the kingdom: David, Solomon and Rehoboam, had been uncovered.

He is the author of 12 books and more than 100 articles.

Garfinkel's talk is free and open to all Tusculum family members and the community. We look forward to seeing you.


Today's chapel topic: whether Christianity is that different from other religions


