Airport shuttles are available

Students who are enrolled at Tusculum for the spring semester are eligible to receive shuttle service to campus from the Tri-Cities and Knoxville airports in Tennessee and the Asheville, North Carolina, airport.

Student-athletes need to sign up with their coaches, and all other students should sign up in the Office of Student Affairs.

Shuttle signups began Monday, Jan. 3. Shuttles will be available from Tuesday, Jan. 10-Tuesday, Jan 17. Shuttles will run from 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. We encourage students to book flights that meet these periods, as shuttles may not be available outside that time frame. If students arrive after the 7 p.m. shuttle, they should plan for overnight lodging and utilize the next morning's shuttle.

Students who are not athletes need to email studentaffairs@tusculum.edu to schedule and confirm a shuttle time.

Students will be charged \$25 to use the shuttle service. The cost will be added to their student account. Students do not need to pay the shuttle driver.

Cancer research project on campus receives further support

Dr. Dennis Ashford, associate professor of chemistry, has received another fellowship from the Appalachian College Association that will enable him to spend more time on the anti-cancer drug research project conducted by Tusculum chemistry and biology students.

The fellowship will pay another instructor to teach one of Dr. Ashford's courses in the fall and spring semesters of the 2023-24 academic year. It is the second fellowship Dr. Ashford has earned from the ACA for this initiative.

"Having the fellowship frees up more of my time to mentor the research students when the largest number of them are on campus," Dr. Ashford said. "It also provides me with further capacity to assist with some of the research and take care of administrative issues pertaining to this project."

The research group is looking at potential medications that can be activated by light to kill cancerous cells. Dr. Ashford said current chemotherapy treatments are effective but are harsh on the body and can impact noncancerous cells. Tusculum's research is focused on creating a drug that will kill the cancer but provide much less severe side effects from treatment by distributing medicine solely to the cancerous portion of the body.

Newest edition of The Tusculum Review has been issued

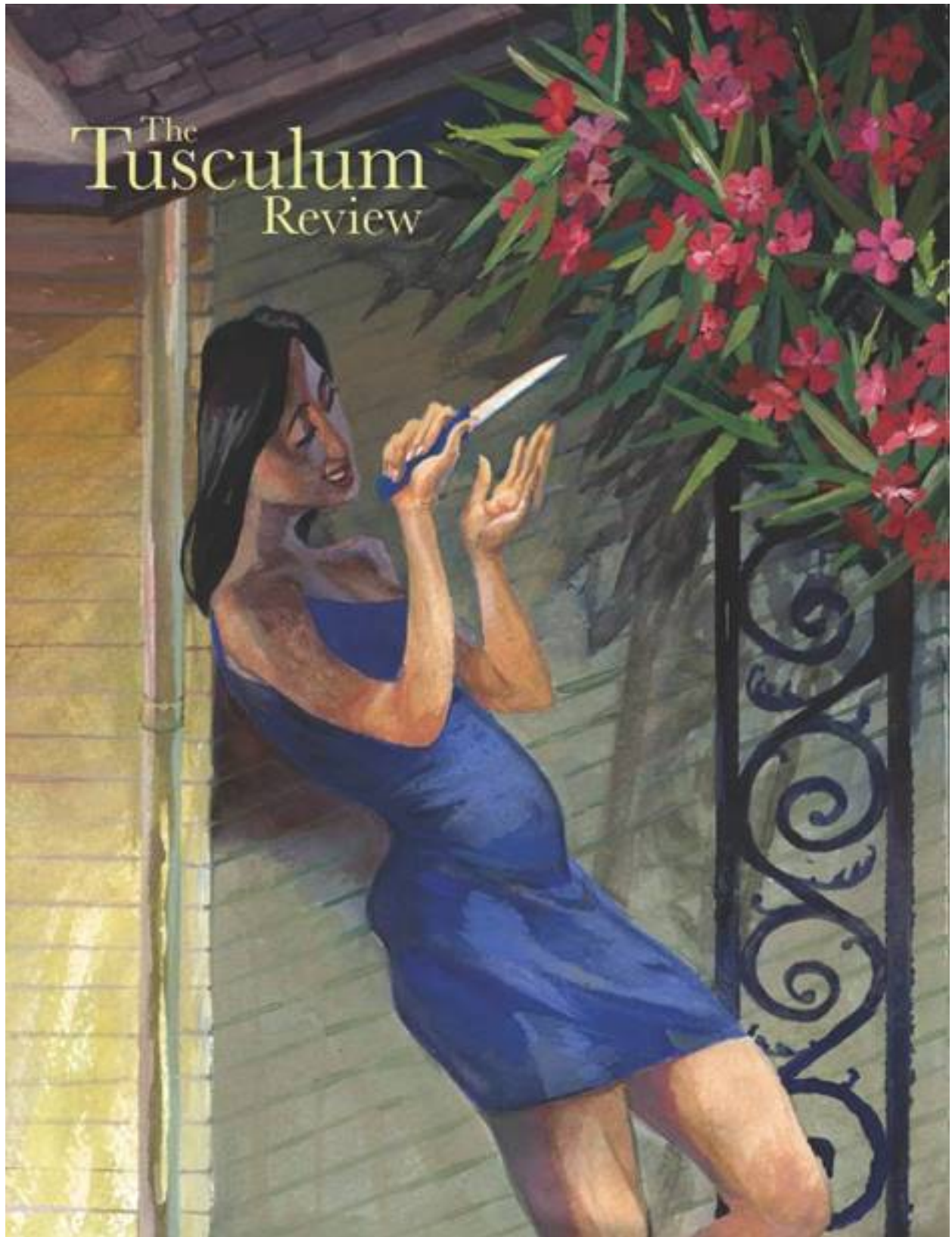
The newest edition of The Tusculum Review, the university's international literary journal, has been published and is available for purchase.

Master of Arts in education graduates making their mark

Two of our Master of Arts in education graduates have earned recent recognition for their efforts to make their students career-ready professionals.

Alicia Keplinger has been named Teacher of the Year for kindergarten through fourth grade at Hunter Elementary School in Carter County! She is a third grade English language arts and social studies teacher. A story in the Elizabethton Star said she displays exceptional qualities inside and outside the classroom, including tutoring before and after school and maintaining a fun and engaging classroom.

Keplinger graduated from Tusculum University in 2019 with a Master of Arts in education, with a concentration in curriculum and instruction.

“Having a master’s in curriculum and instruction has given me a deeper insight on the different teaching strategies I use in my classroom,” she said. “It has allowed me to better understand my students and what they need to learn. I have been able to provide a better teaching environment that allows my students to think creatively and ask meaningful questions that support their education. It has been an overall positive impact on my career.”

Keplinger speaks highly of Tusculum’s College of Education faculty.

“Every professor I had was attentive and caring,” she said. “They had time for me whenever I needed them. I could tell they were passionate about what they were teaching. I knew I would benefit in my classroom from each of their assignments.”

In addition, the Tennessee Independent Colleges and Universities Association recently sent an email spotlighting Brian McLaughlin. He was the 2019-2020 Tennessee Teacher of the Year.

He taught at Morristown-Hamblen High School West for 13 years before he transitioned to work on the assessment team at the Tennessee Department of Education in fall 2021. He is TCAP development coordinator: math.

Former Tusculum board chairman passes away

Tusculum University was saddened to learn of the passing of Dr. Robert H. Bailey, a former chair of our Board of Trustees, who most recently served as a life trustee. However, we remember him fondly and appreciate all of his efforts to make a positive difference in the university and our students.

Dr. Bailey graduated from Tusculum in 1948 with a history degree. While he was a student, he was involved in the choir and theater. After graduation, he earned a law degree from the University of Tennessee and practiced law.

He gave back to Tusculum by establishing several endowed scholarships. He regularly attended Homecoming and other events at the university. Dr. Bailey served on our Board of Trustees from 1969-1979 and became a life trustee in 2011. He received the Distinguished Service Award in 2005 and the Pioneer Award in 2012. In 1984, Dr. Bailey earned an honorary Doctor of Laws from Tusculum.

When the board granted Dr. Bailey life trustee status, he was recognized for exemplifying Tusculum's civic arts ideals in his professional and civic life. He was active in the Ruritans. He served as district governor, national director and president of Ruritan National. Dr. Bailey was active in the Free and Accepted Masons, serving as the Potentate of the Knoxville Shriners in 1976 and in the Imperial Shrine for more than 40 years.

Tusculum lost a highly regarded retired faculty member Tuesday, Jan. 3, with the passing of Ron Conley, and his former students are praising him for his work in the classroom.

Conley retired in 2013 as an associate professor of mathematics. In response to Tusculum sharing the news about his death on Facebook and Instagram, many alumni shared their memories and feelings about him. Here is a sample of the comments:

“My last class at Tusculum and one I had to pass. Thanks Mr. Conley!” – Mark Purifoy

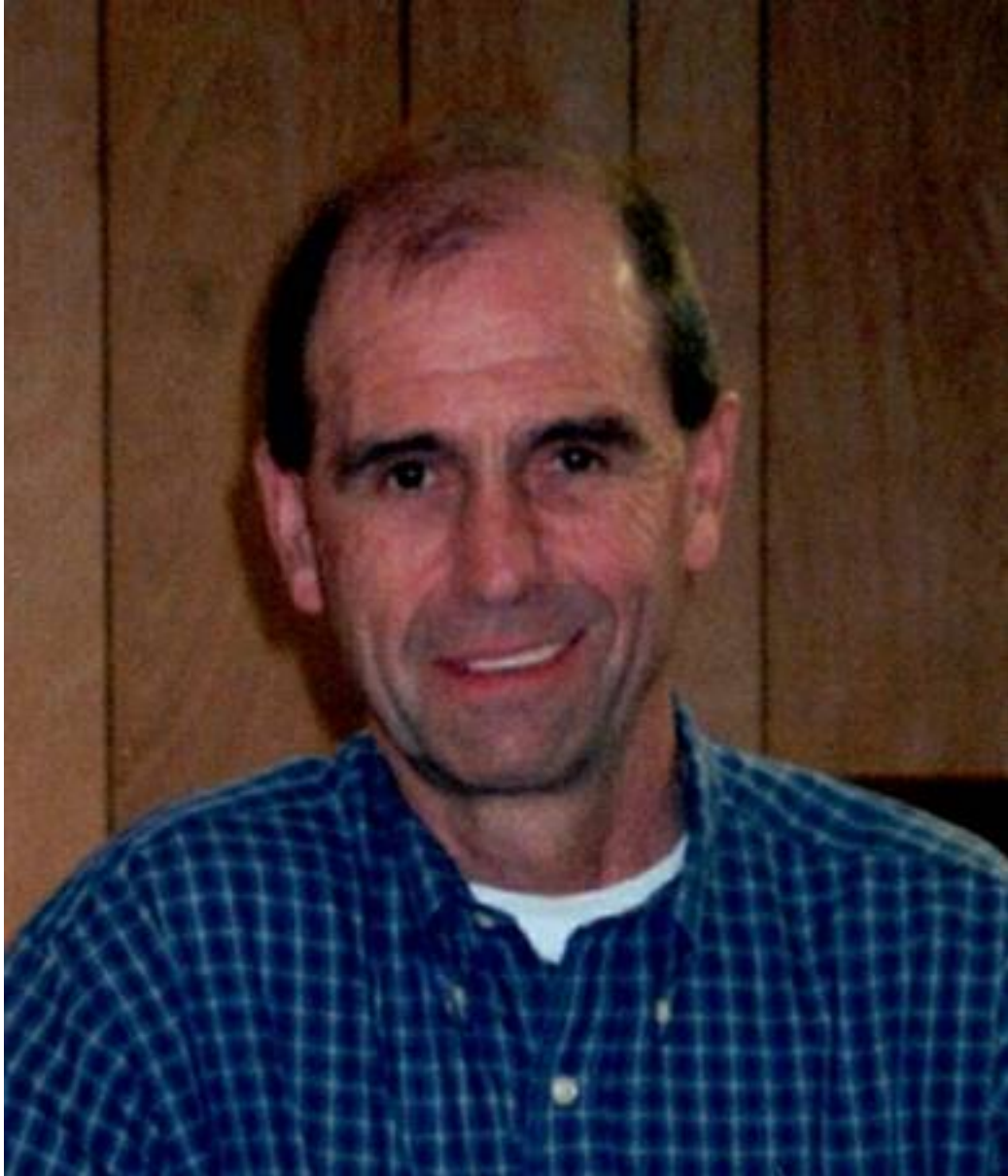
In addition to his stellar performance as a teacher, Conley contributed to Tusculum’s success in other ways. He served on numerous governance committees, search committees and task forces and was Mathematics Department chair.

Lillian Burchnell, certification officer and advisor for the College of Education, shared some of her memories of Conley.

“Of the three musketeers that served together for over 100 years at Tusculum in Tredway Hall, Ron Conley was the most serious, God-fearing man you could ever hope to meet,” she said. “On many occasions, we discussed the Bible and our families. His wisdom impacts me to this day, and I am sure many others share this view. He would spend long hours making sure that his students understand the math they needed to learn to be successful. Ron will be greatly missed by everyone who knew him.”

100-year-old alumna held strong memories of Tusculum

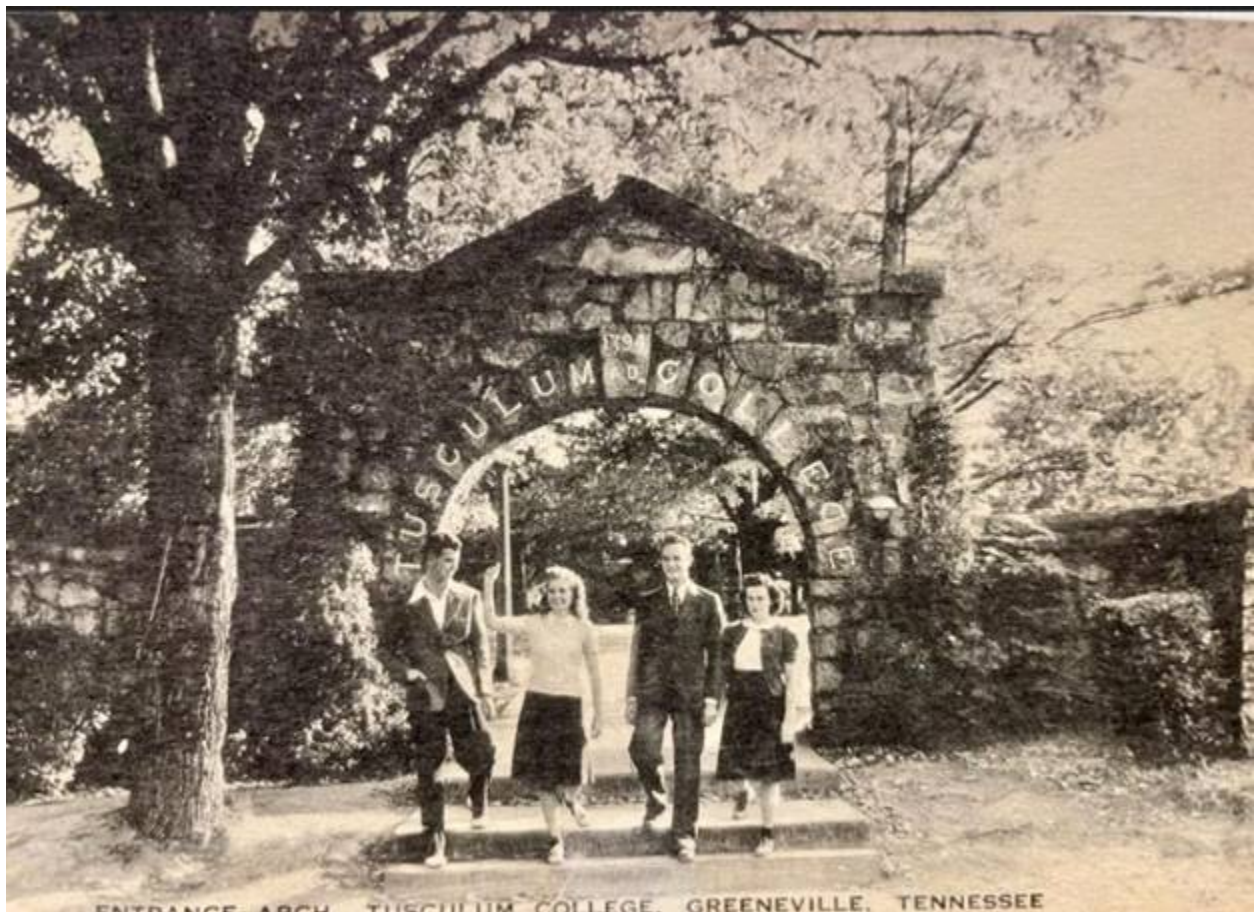
Tusculum University reflects with gratitude on the life of Jeanne Campbell Pflum, a 100-year-old alumna of our institution, who passed away in December.

She was a 1943 graduate of Tusculum who was born in Greeneville but was living in Wrentham, Massachusetts, when she died.

Pflum was a substitute teacher, a religious education teacher and a library assistant. She was also active in her church, serving as a lector and Eucharistic minister and delivering the Eucharist to the homebound and baptismal certificates to parishioners.

When Pflum was 96, her granddaughter, Elizabeth Ellwood-Hall, wrote to our Office of Alumni Relations shared her grandmother’s reflections about Tusculum. Ellwood-Hall had bought “Tusculum College Tennessee: The College History Series” by Frank T. Wheeler and showed her grandmother some of the photos. Here were some of her reactions to some of the events and people in the photos:

- “Daddy Haynes - he was like a father to me. What a wonderful man!”
- “Professor Shanks! I'll never forget that face.”
- “Ms. Stetson - it was hard to find a female scientist in those days. What an inspiration.”
- “Oh! May Day! All of us from town went to the college and participated in the May Pole; I can just see all the colors and music.”
- “Mountain Day! Good gad. That was such a climb, but it gave us such a feeling of independence. That's when I met your grandfather.”
