## Enjoy a ballet this weekend on campus

The ballet covers creation, Noah's ark, Babel, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and Joseph. ## Make your plans to visit Israel

Dr. Hummel is leading another trip to Israel from June 22-July 2, and all Tusculum family members are welcome to attend. Those who go on the trip have the opportunity to earn three credit hours if they would like to satisfy general education or religion course requirements.

In addition, students and staff can also participate from July 2-20 in excavation work at Tel-Lachish, where the ruins of the ancient Canaanite and Judean cities of Lachish are located. Students can earn three credit hours from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, which will be transferable to Tusculum.

Highlights of the tour of Israel include Caesarea, Nazareth, the Sea of Galilee, Caesarea-Philippi, the Jordan River, Megiddo (Armageddon), the Cliffs of Arbel, Jericho, Qumran, Masada, Bethlehem, Jerusalem, the Mount of Olives, the Garden of Gethsemane, Hezekiah's Tunnel, Lachish and the Valley of Elah, where David fought Goliath. Participants will hike cliffs, visit ancient ruins, ride a boat across the Sea of Galilee, walk across the Mediterranean beach and walk along the Via Dolorosa. The group that visited in 2022 also ate fish from the Sea of Galilee.

Dr. Hummel describes the tour as the trip of a lifetime.

The cost for the Israel tour is \$5,399 for those who stay in a double-occupancy room and \$5,299 for those who utilize a triple-occupancy room. The price includes round trip airfare from Charlotte, N.C., hotel, breakfast and dinner, motorcoaches, guided sightseeing and entrance fees. Students who take the trip will receive a scholarship of at least \$1,000.

The costs for the excavation are \$1,650 for room and board and \$480 for the three hours of credit. Those who go only for the excavation will also have to pay for airfare on top of that.

Participants need to register by Wednesday, March 15. You can learn more and register for the Israel triphere. ## Watch out for scams; TDIS can help

Students and employees need to be cautious when they receive emails encouraging them to take action that could expose their Tusculum and personal accounts to being compromised.

A few quick tips: Tusculum will never ask for your account information via email, and we will not ask you to buy gift cards. This site, <a href="https://www.techtarget.com/searchsecurity/tip/2019s-top-email-security-best-practices-for-employees">https://www.techtarget.com/searchsecurity/tip/2019s-top-email-security-best-practices-for-employees</a>, can provide helpful guidance.

The best solution when an email does not look legitimate or you want to be sure is to forward it to the Tusculum Department of Information Systems at <a href="mailto:tdis@tusculum.edu">tdis@tusculum.edu</a> and ask for guidance. The department will alert Tusculum family members about bogus emails. Do not feel ill at ease about relying on TDIS to assist you because employees there are happy to help.

## **Summer job opportunities for Upward Bound camp**
