Deadline today to apply to study abroad in Northern Ireland!

Sophomores and juniors interested in studying in a foreign country can apply for the Irish American Scholars program through the Association of Presbyterian Colleges and Universities.

This initiative provides a tuition-free opportunity for qualified students at one of five higher education institutions in Northern Ireland for one or two semesters. The institutions are:

- Belfast Metropolitan College
- · Queens University Belfast
- St. Mary's University College
- Stranmillis University College
- Ulster University

Students can apply to study in Northern Ireland in the following academic year. Applicants must have a minimum GPA of 3.2 and submit an application packet by Monday, Feb. 7 to Lanna Monday, assistant professor of art and design, at Imonday@tusculum.edu. Further details are available here.

APCU is an independent, not-for-profit organization dedicated to the support and advancement of colleges and universities that maintain a historical affiliation to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

New agreement benefits students wanting to become a physician assistant

Recently, Tusculum signed an agreement that will support students who are interested in becoming a physician assistant.

Students who meet eligibility requirements will receive a guaranteed interview with Lincoln Memorial University's physician assistant program. The agreement between the two institutions will apply primarily to Tusculum biology majors who will have completed core courses needed to enter the LMU physician assistant program on its campuses in Harrogate and Knoxville. But other Tusculum students who complete the prerequisites for the program will be eligible to receive an interview as well.

Candidates accepted into the LMU program will be on a path to earn a Master of Medical Science in physician assistant studies.

Dr. Heather Henson-Ramsey, dean of the College of Science, Technology and Mathematics, took a group of students to LMU's Knoxville facility to explore the program. The students impressed LMU, and that led to the agreement being finalized, she said.



Support for students with mental health needs

Students needing assistance with their mental health have a couple of special resources available to them at Tusculum – our counseling services and the Ballad Health Tusculum University Clinic.

Students can schedule a counseling appointment with Tommy Delbridge, a licensed clinical social worker, or Stephanie Edwards, a licensed professional counselor. You can request an appointment by completing the form at https://my.tusculum.edu/forms/request-an-appointment/ or by emailingcounseling@tusculum.edu. They will be pleased to assist you.

Delbridge and Edwards meet with students in person in Rooms 230 and 233 of the Thomas J. Garland Library, and they also conduct virtual sessions.

If students have a medical need associated with their mental health care, they can go to the clinic in Room 008 of the Meen Center. Alice Lawson, the nurse practitioner in the facility and an assistant professor of nursing at Tusculum, can assess their condition and determine whether medical assistance can be provided. Students who are currently on medication and need a refill can go to the clinic to discuss that with Lawson. She will determine whether she can write the prescription.

We are focused on students' well-being and want them to be aware of these helpful options.

Black Student Union planning a busy spring semester

Attracting new members has occurred through a number of activities, including a table in the Niswonger Commons, a cookout in the fall and a bonfire with s'mores at the Doak House Museum.

"Dr. Everhart works tirelessly to make sure this whole thing runs smoothly," Heppard said. "The executive board is constantly working to recruit more members. Participation by the members and their input on strategies to gain more members have been keys to success as well."



Take the trip of a lifetime and visit Israel this summer!

Tusculum family members are invited to join Dr. Hummel as he leads a trip to Israel from June 22-July 2. Those who go can earn three credit hours if they want to satisfy general education or religion course requirements.

In addition, students and staff can participate from July 2-20 in excavation work at Tel-Lachish, home of the ruins of the ancient Canaanite and Judean cities of Lachish. Students can earn three credit hours from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, which can transfer to Tusculum.

The cost for the Israel tour is \$5,399 for those who stay in a double-occupancy room and \$5,299 for those who utilize a triple-occupancy room. The price includes round trip airfare from Charlotte, N.C., hotel, breakfast and dinner, motorcoaches, guided sightseeing and entrance fees. Students who take the trip will receive a scholarship of at least \$1,000.

The costs for the excavation are \$1,650 for room and board and \$480 for the three hours of credit. Those who go only for the excavation will have to pay for airfare on top of that.
