### **Checkout procedures for the spring semester**

The Office of Student Affairs wants to alert students about proper checkout procedures to avoid charges. **Students who decide to check out before the end of the semester need to understand they are voluntarily terminating their housing contract and will not be refunded.**

Please review these [checkout steps](#).

Students may check out with a resident assistant from 8 a.m.-9 p.m. each day at Student Affairs. If they need to check out between 9 p.m. and 8 a.m., they need to see their RA for a pre-checkout and understand that any damages or cleaning needs that arise afterward will be charged to their account.

**Nongraduating students are required to complete this checkout by Friday, May 5, at 5 p.m. Graduating students are required to complete the checkout by Sunday, May 7, at noon.** Anyone who needs to stay past this date must receive approval from Student Affairs.

## Summer and fall registration continues

Students can still register for summer and fall classes. We encourage anyone who has not completed the registration process to take care of this matter as soon as possible.

Taking classes in the summer makes life easier, potentially reducing students' course load in the fall or spring or graduating early. Registering for the fall as quickly as possible ensures students have a better chance of being able to enroll in the classes they want and need.

Here are the summer sessions:

- Full – May 15-Aug. 11
- Early – May 15-June 23
- Late – June 26-Aug. 11

**Students cannot register for housing in the fall until they have registered for classes.** Also, they will not be able to register for courses if they have a business office hold on their student account. In addition, they must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses.

## Obtaining housing for the fall

We remind returning students who have not applied for fall housing to complete that task as soon as possible by visiting <https://my.tusculum.edu/forms/housing-lottery-form/>.

**Students cannot participate in the housing lottery if they have not registered for fall classes. Students must ensure they are cleared with all other offices, including business, financial aid and the registrar.** Those who are not cleared with any of these offices will need to resolve the hold and will not be housed until it is removed.

When students make their first, second and third preferences, they cannot pick the same location more than once. Due to the high number of requests for the apartments, the D room will return to a double space. It will also be priced at a discounted rate.




