College of Education earns full approval from the state

Our College of Education received excellent news recently when the Tennessee State Board of Education approved a designation of full approval for Tusculum.

In 2020, the Tennessee State Board of Education classified the College of Education's status as full approval with minor stipulations. Within three months of that vote, the College of Education worked with the Tennessee Department of Education to develop and implement an action plan focused on addressing the minor stipulations.

In September 2021 and July 2022, the department conducted progress reviews and concluded the College of Education had provided sufficient evidence that progress was made in addressing each of the minor stipulations. The department recommended that the State Board of Education grant full approval without stipulations. The State Board of Education voted Friday, Feb. 10, to approve the department's recommendation.

We commend the College of Education for its excellence in drafting a well-designed plan, enacting it and achieving this outstanding result. The faculty, staff and leadership of the College of Education are committed to attaining the highest standards, and their efforts have borne fruit. We congratulate Dr. Miriam Stroder, the dean, and everyone else in the College of Education for this outcome from the state.

Graduation policy change enacted

We are excited to share that beginning with the May 6 graduation, students who have not yet completed all requirements of their degree but have no more than six hours of coursework remaining will be able to participate in the commencement ceremony.

If students will be within six credits hours of completing their degree requirements at the end of this semester, these are the steps to apply to participate in the May commencement ceremony:

- 1. If they have not already done so, they need to complete the <u>Application for Graduation</u> form right away.
- 2. Finalize an advisor-approved plan to complete remaining coursework and submit the completed Early Commencement Participation Request form to the Registrar's Office
- 3. Pay off the student account balance in full at least two weeks prior to commencement.

Important note: Although students may be approved to participate in the commencement ceremony early, their degree will not be conferred until the next graduation date following completion of their coursework.

Also, please be aware Tusculum will no longer be holding commencement ceremonies in August. Those who will finish their programs in August will participate in either the May or December graduation event.


Auditions scheduled for the "5 X 10 Plays"

Deadline approaching for the Israel trip!

The deadline to Join Dr. Hummel as he leads a trip to Israel from June 22-July 2 is less than a month away. Participants need to register by Wednesday, March 15. You can learn more and register for the Israel trip here.

Make your reservations now! Those who go can earn three credit hours if they want to satisfy general education or religion course requirements.

In addition, students and staff can participate from July 2-20 in excavation work at Tel-Lachish, home of the ruins of the ancient Canaanite and Judean cities of Lachish. Students can earn three credit hours from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, which can transfer to Tusculum.

The cost for the Israel tour is \$5,399 for those who stay in a double-occupancy room and \$5,299 for those who utilize a triple-occupancy room. The price includes round trip airfare from Charlotte, N.C., hotel, breakfast and dinner, motorcoaches, guided sightseeing and entrance fees. Students who take the trip will receive a scholarship of at least \$1,000.

The costs for the excavation are \$1,650 for room and board and \$480 for the three hours of credit. Those who go only for the excavation will have to pay for airfare on top of that.


Academic Symposium submission deadline set

The three summer terms are:

Students cannot register if they have not met with their advisor or have a business hold.

In keeping with the traditional flow, the first day for registration will be:

- · Monday, March 27 graduate students, veterans, adult and online studies students and honors students
- · Tuesday, March 28 seniors
- · Wednesday, March 29 juniors
- · Thursday, March 30 sophomores
- · Friday, March 31 first-year students

It is important for students to remember:

- They must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses.
- They will not be able to register for courses if they have a business office hold on their student account.
- They will not be able to participate in the housing lottery if they do not register for courses to be held in the fall.

Efficient care of assigned keys and spaces is beneficial and important to the institution.


Archaeology presentation coming to Tusculum in March

Dr. Bebel Ibarra, a native Peruvian archaeologist, who now lives in Greeneville, will discuss his recent work on pre-Columbian Andean societies during a lecture on campus Wednesday, March 22, at 2 p.m. The location of his talk is to be determined.

The title of his presentation is "Bioarchaeology and the Cult of the Dead in the Peruvian Andes." All Tusculum family members are invited to attend.

Dr. Ibarra specializes in Andean archaeology and holds a doctorate in anthropology from Tulane University in New Orleans. His research is focused on bioarchaeology and the study of ancestor veneration and the cult of the dead within the region.

Although human remains analysis has been a particular interest in his studies, through collaborative research, multiple topics such as paleopathology, isotope analyses and DNA sequences have also been addressed. Dr. Bebel teaches anthropology at Walters State Community College. He has been leading the annual Huari–Ancash Bioarchaeological research project in Peru since 2004.




Conservation Core formed on campus

Earlier, Tusculum family members and community members celebrated the opening of the newest location for the Clem Allison Gallery. The event featured 16 pieces of art belonging to Bledsoe, an accomplished local artist for 45 years, including the last seven years as the leader of Tusculum's studio art program.

During the gallery event, Bledsoe said Allison, who served as director of the division of arts and humanities at Tusculum before his retirement, is just as genuine, kind and considerate today as he was the first time they met. He called Allison a mentor and encourager and said they engage in many conversations about life. He was pleased the gallery was named in Allison's honor.


Allison returned the compliment, saying Bledsoe has done a phenomenal job with the art program and taken it far beyond what Allison was able to do. He praised the lighting and layout in the gallery and said the new setting is beautiful and ideally located near the Marilyn duBrisk Theatre.

Bledsoe was recognized as one of the top 100 artists of Tennessee in 1987, and his work is part of a permanent collection in the Frist Art Museum in Nashville. He was commissioned to create a painting celebrating the 225th anniversary of Tennessee and Jonesborough, the state's oldest town.

He is well-known in the region for spearheading the campaign to rename Tennessee's NFL football team when it moved from Houston, and he worked with NFL properties, ownership and the state of Tennessee on this endeavor.

The group participated in the Great Backyard Bird Count. Using binoculars as needed, they saw 22 different species, including the belted kingfisher, yellow-rumped warbler, tufted titmouse, eastern blue bird and turkey vulture
