More good news for the anti-cancer drug research project

Tusculum's cutting-edge anti-cancer drug research project received another boost last week with word that the Arthur Vining Davis Foundations awarded another grant.

The organization renewed its earlier grant for an additional \$81,690. The funds will provide stipends for the next two summers for undergraduate students who participate in the research project as well for Dr. Dennis Ashford, associate professor of chemistry, who oversees the initiative.

The grant will also provide funds for students involved in the research project to present at regional and national scientific conferences. Other expenses covered will include a chemical search engine and equipment needs.

Undergraduate chemistry and biology students have worked for more than four years on a new drug to fight cancer. The research team is looking at potential medications that can be activated by light to kill cancerous cells. Tusculum's research is focused on creating a drug that will kill the cancer but provide much less severe side effects from treatment by distributing medicine solely to the cancerous portion of the body.

We congratulate Dr. Ashford and the students on this grant renewal and wish them further success in their research!

Registration deadline for the Israel trip is March 15!

Time is of the essence to register for the trip to Israel led by Dr. Hummel. If you are interested, you need to register by Wednesday, March 15. The trip runs from June 22-July 2. You can learn more and register here.

Those who go can earn three credit hours if they want to satisfy general education or religion course requirements. The cost for the Israel tour is \$5,399 for those who stay in a double-occupancy room and

\$5,299 for those who utilize a triple-occupancy room. The price includes round trip airfare from Charlotte, N.C., hotel, breakfast and dinner, motorcoaches, guided sightseeing and entrance fees. Students who take the trip will receive a scholarship of at least \$1,000.

In addition, students and staff can participate from July 2-20 in excavation work at Tel-Lachish, home of the ruins of the ancient Canaanite and Judean cities of Lachish. Students can earn three credit hours from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, which can transfer to Tusculum. The costs for the excavation are \$1,650 for room and board and \$480 for the three hours of credit. Those who go only for the excavation will have to pay for airfare on top of that.

After the Cap and Gown graduate degree program coming April 4



Archaeologist originally from Peru giving presentation March 22

All Tusculum family members are invited to a presentation from a native Peruvian archaeologist Wednesday, March 22, at 2 p.m. in the Meen Center lecture hall.

Dr. Bebel Ibarra, who now lives in Greeneville, will discuss his recent work on pre-Columbian Andean societies. The title of his presentation is "Bioarchaeology and the Cult of the Dead in the Peruvian Andes."

Dr. Ibarra specializes in Andean archaeology and holds a doctorate in anthropology from Tulane University in New Orleans. Dr. Bebel teaches anthropology at Walters State Community College.

His research is focused on bioarchaeology and the study of ancestor veneration and the cult of the dead within the region. He has led the annual Huari–Ancash Bioarchaeological research project in Peru since 2004.

Revised work schedule during the summer

To provide some flexibility during the summer, employees will be able to complete their 40-hour work week differently.

Beginning the week of May 22 and concluding the week of July 24, offices on campus will be closed on Fridays. Employees can work with their supervisors to determine how they will complete their 40 hours each week during that period.

For example, supervisors can approve a schedule in which their direct reports can work 10 hours a day Monday-Thursday and then not work on Fridays. Employees are also eligible, with approval from their supervisor, to work eight-hour days in the office Monday-Thursday and then complete their eight hours remotely on Fridays. Employees who would experience difficulty working a 40-hour week in a revised manner can request their supervisor to approve the use of PTO for unworked hours.

We are pleased to provide this revised summer schedule for this year to reduce employee travel expenses while helping the university conserve energy resources.

- Monday, March 27 graduate students, veterans, adult and online studies students and honors students
- · Tuesday, March 28 seniors
- · Wednesday, March 29 juniors
- · Thursday, March 30 sophomores
- · Friday, March 31 first-year students

It is important for students to remember:

- They must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses.
- They will not be able to register for courses if they have a business office hold on their student account.
- They will not be able to participate in the housing lottery if they do not register for courses to be held in the fall.


