Experienced fundraiser named to lead the Office of Institutional Advancement

Edward Roberts, a 25-year fundraising veteran in higher education and other nonprofit organizations, has been named vice president for institutional advancement. He began his duties today and will work at the Welcome Center building at the corner of the Erwin Highway and Gilland Street.

He will team with Jolin Hawk, director of development; Belle Kemp, director of alumni and community engagement; Robin Crabtree, grants and foundation manager; and Susan Carson, advancement services specialist, to achieve the university' fundraising goals and enhance Tusculum's relationships with our former students.

One of Roberts' first initiatives will be to collaborate with Kemp to ensure the success of a recently launched \$110,000 Dorm Refresh Campaign, which is designed to enhance the look and comfort of Tusculum's residence halls. He will also be active in maintaining our relationships with current donors as well as cultivating new ones to meet our mission and strategic goals. He will also serve on the Executive Cabinet.

Roberts most recently served as vice president of institutional advancement at Lees-McRae College in Banner Elk, North Carolina. He is excited to be part of the Tusculum family and believes the university is positioned for growth. He also commended Kim Kidwell, who is transitioning from leading the Office of Institutional Advancement to serving as executive assistant to the president, for leaving the office in excellent shape.

Revised employee work schedule for the summer starts today

Beginning this week and concluding the week of July 24, offices on campus will be closed on Fridays. Employees can work with their supervisors to determine how they will complete their 40 hours each week during that period.

For example, supervisors can approve a schedule in which their direct reports work 10 hours a day Monday-Thursday and then be off Fridays. Employees are also eligible, with approval from their supervisor, to work eight-hour days in the office Monday-Thursday and then complete their eight hours remotely on Fridays. Employees who would experience difficulty working a 40-hour week in a revised manner can request their supervisor to approve the use of PTO for unworked hours.

The Registrar's Office will be open from 8 a.m.-7 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Thursday and from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Wednesday. The office might periodically be open later Wednesday, but that is not guaranteed. Many staff members in the Registrar's Office will work remotely Friday, so email responses should be available that day.

The Thomas J. Garland Library will be open 7:30 a.m.-6 p.m. Monday-Thursday.

Summer sessions have begun

The full and early summer sessions have begun, but students can still register for the late session, which runs from Jun 26-Aug. 11.

Taking classes in the summer potentially reduces students' course load in the fall or spring or helping our Pioneers graduate early.

Registration for fall courses is also still available. Completing this process as quickly as possible ensures students have a better chance of enrolling in the classes they want and need.

Students cannot register for housing in the fall until they have registered for classes. Also, they will not be able to register for courses if they have a business office hold on their student account. In addition, they must meet with their advisor before they can choose their courses.

Fall housing applications

Returning students who have not applied for fall housing need to complete that task as soon as possible by visiting https://my.tusculum.edu/forms/housing-lottery-form/.

Students cannot receive housing if they have not registered for fall classes. They must ensure they are cleared with all other offices, including business, financial aid and the registrar. Those who are not cleared with any of these offices will need to resolve the hold and will not be housed until it is removed.

When students select their first, second and third preferences, they cannot pick the same location more than once. Due to the high number of requests for the apartments, the D room will return to a double space. It will also be priced at a discounted rate.

Reminders

It features the "TU" logo followed by a vertical line and then the office occupant's name. You can request a door name by completing the <u>branding request form</u>. The door signs are free. 
