Summer schedule changes

Now that the spring semester has concluded, we will have some changes in schedules on campus until the start of the fall semester. Among them are:

- The Thomas J. Garland Library will be open from 8 a.m.-6 p.m. Monday-Thursday and from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Friday. The library will be closed on Fridays during the altered work schedule period (story below).

- The cafeteria will be closed except for those who are participating in camps.

Reminder about employees' revised work schedule during the summer

To provide some flexibility during the summer, employees will be able to complete their 40-hour work week differently.

Beginning the week of May 22 and concluding the week of July 24, offices on campus will be closed on Fridays. Employees can work with their supervisors to determine how they will complete their 40 hours each week during that period.

For example, supervisors can approve a schedule in which their direct reports can work 10 hours a day Monday-Thursday and then not work on Fridays. Employees are also eligible, with approval from their supervisor, to work eight-hour days in the office Monday-Thursday and then complete their eight hours remotely on Fridays. Employees who would experience difficulty working a 40-hour week in a revised manner can request their supervisor to approve the use of PTO for unworked hours.

We are pleased to provide this revised summer schedule for this year to reduce employee travel expenses while helping the university conserve energy resources.

Registration for fall courses is also still available. Completing this process as quickly as possible ensures students have a better chance of enrolling in the classes they want and need.



Applying for fall housing

Returning students who have not applied for fall housing need to complete that task as soon as possible by visiting https://my.tusculum.edu/forms/housing-lottery-form/.

Students cannot participate in the housing lottery if they have not registered for fall classes. Students must ensure they are cleared with all other offices, including business, financial aid and the registrar. Those who are not cleared with any of these offices will need to resolve the hold and will not be housed until it is removed.

When students select their first, second and third preferences, they cannot pick the same location more than once. Due to the high number of requests for the apartments, the D room will return to a double space. It will also be priced at a discounted rate.

Tusculum hosts Congressional Art Competition

We were pleased Friday, May 5, to serve as the host of the Congressional Art Competition for Tennessee's 1st District.

Art prepared by high school students in the district hung in Annie Hogan Byrd Fine Arts Center. During the ceremony later in the morning, Bill Bledsoe, assistant professor of art and design, emphasized the importance of drawing and painting in securing a degree in art.

Dr. Hummel was able to talk about the university's strengths. He talked about the students who designed a custom graphics package for the Ford Mustang in 2021 and a student who helped design the branding for a university vehicle. He also highlighted Tusculum's affordability.

Afterward, Laura King, executive director of traditional admission, joined Congresswoman Diana Harshbarger at Dobyns-Bennett High School in Kingsport and presented certificates for scholarships to two students there who earned awards in the competition.

Final webinar about first-generation students next week

The final free webinar for faculty and staff members, provided by Student Support Services and ARCHES, related to supporting first-generation college students will be Tuesday, May, 16, from 11 a.m.-noon. This was originally scheduled for Monday, May 15, but SSS and ARCHES needed to revise the date.

The webinar, available through Zoom, is a pre-recorded presentation from a higher education expert. The title is "Traversing new territory as low-income first-generation students of color."

The presentation examines how institutional values of independence ignore the familial commitments of low-income, first-generation students of color and consequently undermine their well-being and performance, especially during the transition to college. The presenter will discuss how such cultural

mismatches manifested before the COVID-19 pandemic and explore preliminary research on the ways in which shifts to remote learning exacerbated these mismatches.



Reminders

- New door signs are available for faculty and staff members. The sign identifies the occupant of an office with university branding. It features the "TU" logo followed by a vertical line and then the office occupant's name. You can request a door name by completing the <u>branding request form</u>. The door signs are free. Anyone who wants a holder for the sign should email Chad Grindstaff, director of the Facilities Management Department, at <u>cgrindstaff@tusculum.edu</u>.
- Tusculum wants to be sure everyone is aware of the policy on posting and distributing materials on campus. Materials may not be posted on any undesignated areas, including wood or painted surfaces, doors, glass, walls, car windshields, or over previously posted materials. Tile or cement walls may be permissive but must be checked with the facility manager. The university has ordered cork strips for all elevators on campus and will add a bulletin board near the Center for Academic Success and Tutoring on the ground floor of the Meen Center.
- The key audit by the Facilities Management Department continues. Remaining departments and offices will be notified when facilities management will visit. Employees who have keys they were not assigned will need to complete paperwork to properly document possession.
